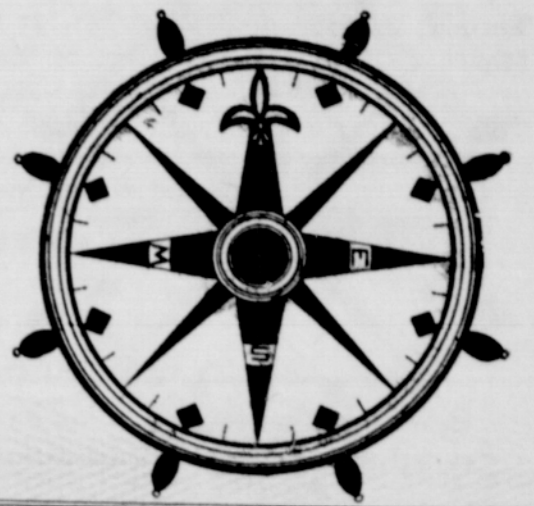

Name Picked For Local Assoc'tion

Gearin Will Head Co. Chest Drive For Current Year

SALEM—Hugh C. Gearin, district attorney for Curry County, has been named to head up the Community Chest drive which takes place in October. The last county chairman who served in this capacity was Bernard Mather of Gold Beach.

In 1949 the county was solicited jointly being divided into two parts with a chairman from both Brookings and Gold Beach. This, however, seemed to lack the co-ordination that brings the best results, and therefore, the state chest this year has selected Mr. Gearin to co-ordinate the county drive.

Quota for Curry county this year is \$731, this being somewhat under the quota for 1948. It is not known at this time whether there will be any local agencies involved in this year's drive.

In accepting the chairmanship of Curry county chest, Mr. Gearin stated that it would be his intention to organize an advisory committee from individuals in various parts of the county whose responsibility would be to assist in the organization and helping to make decisions when they are necessary in the operation of the Curry county chest.

In the year 1948 was the first year that Curry county did not raise its proportionate share of the money for the child-care agencies of the state. The representative who appointed Mr. Gearin stated that he was confident that Curry county will make its quota this year.

Thermostat Loss Delays Pilot Several Hours

A thermostat which controls the heat on the linotype pot, a gadget which is not seen by any person unless he is a machinist and looking for it, burned out, or became so disabled Monday that the Pilot was without use of the typesetter.

Chetco Cove Will Be Reviewed Here Wed., Sept. 14th

PORTLAND—A resolution by the Committee on Public Works of the House of Representatives, United States, adopted February 17, 1949, reads as follows:

"Resolved by the Committee on public works of the House of Representatives, United States, That the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors be, and is hereby, requested to review the report heretofore submitted on Chetco Cove, Oregon, with a view to determining whether morification of the recommendations contained therein is warranted at the present time."

In order to determine the present desires of interested parties in the above matter, a public hearing will be held by the Engineers in the Grange hall, in Harbor, Oregon, at 10 a. m. (Pacific Standard Time) Wednesday, Sept. 14, 1949.

Information to be submitted should include:

a. The nature and extent of improvement desired, giving depth and widths of channels, harbor area, etc.

b. The number and type of vessels which are now, and which would be accommodated in the future, including draft of vessels.

c. The annual commerce in tons anticipated, with origin and destination, and estimated savings in transportation costs.

d. Location and nature of all terminal facilities considered to be necessary.

e. Amount of local co-operation which might be expected.

Any other information pertinent to the investigation, or any objections to a proposed improvement may also be submitted.

Oral statements will be heard, but for accuracy of the record all important facts and arguments should be submitted in writing, in duplicate, as the records of the hearing will be forwarded for consideration by the higher authorities. Written statements may be presented at the hearing or may be mailed in advance to the Corps of Engineers, 628 Pittock Block, Portland, 5, Oregon.
