SAN FRANCISCO—Southwest Airways Company last week took final steps in formal certification of the cities of Arcata, Napa and Watsonville, California, by filing airport notices with the Civil Aeronautics Board and the Post Office department. These federal agencies were informed that the cities will be "officially" served by Southwest schedules.

Although these three cities have regularly received the benefits of Southwest's service for almost three years, they were not officially designated stops on Air Mail Route 76. As a result of Southwest's action in the California-Nevada case the cities

have now been certificated by the board and placed on the world air map. The stops will henceforth be known as: Eureka-Arcata, Vallejo-Napa, and Santa Cruz-Watsonville, respectively.
