Assessors Will Be Given Meaning Of New State Laws

MEDFORD—In-Service Training for assessors and appraisers will be held here, Oct. 10 and 11, under auspices of the Assessment and Taxation division of the Oregon State Tax commission. This, the fourth such training course held this autumn, will be attended by the following six assessors and their assistants: C. A. Myers, Jackson county; Merle E. Griffin, Josephine county; Otis Metsker, Klamath county; Chas. M. Forrest, Coos county; George Sutton, Curry county and Ned Dixon, Douglas county.

Commissioner Robert D. MacLean, in charge of the Assessment and Taxation division, which is particularly interested in the officers making appraisals and assessments, is bringing a number of experts to give lectures and explain the new book published by the tax commission, "Factors of Cost in Building Materials," copies of which have been mailed to all assessors in the state.

This is the first revision of cost factors made in 18 years and it represents, among other matters, the experience of technicians in the field. The factor book is intended as a guide to appraisals and once understood it will save appraisers time and effort in the dealing with this prase of their responsibilities.

Because of the many changes that have occurred in the construction of housing and the various types of buildings, the factor book will be invaluable. To cite some of the changes, the concrete basement has been discarded by many home builders, and a utility room takes its place; there are new heating plants becoming common, and the two-story house is being replaced by houses with everything on the ground floor as women show a preference to the one-story in most of the new houses, constructed since the war.

There is also more wiring and more plumbing and building blocks of pumice and concrete are coming into greater use, while brick houses are becoming rare in this era of new construction.

These are factors which will be explained by Arthur A. Selander,

chief appraisal engineer of the tax commission; Harry J. Loggan, supervising appraisal engineer; Robert V. Nelson, appraisal engineer and Jesse E. Gilkey, the authority on industrial plants. Howard E. Ross, assistant attorney general, will be present to explain the amendments to the assessment and taxation laws which were enacted by the 1949 legislature, as these impose additional responsibilities on assessors of the state.
