Miss Stansell is a graduate of Gold Beach high school, and has been nursing at the local hospital.

Daniel is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Pinson, former residents of Gold Beach but now of Reedsport. He enlisted in the air force after his graduation from Gold Beach high and recently returned from Clark Field in the Philippines and will report soon to McChord Field for re-assignment. His enlistment expires on Jan. 1, and plans to return to Gold Beach to make his home.

A reception was held following the ceremony. The couple left for Crater Lake for a short wedding trip, which was cut short when Mrs. Pinson was stricken by acute appendicitis at Crater Lake resort, Thursday.
