Second: That the plaintiffs are the owners in fee simple of said real property and the whole thereof.

Third: That none of said defendants has any interest or estate, right, title, or lien upon or in said real property, or any portion thereof paramount to the plaintiffs right, title and interest therein and thereto.

Fourth: That said defendants and each and all of them and all persons claiming under, by or through them, or any of them, be forever barred, restrained and en-

joined from asserting any claim whatever in or to said premises adverse to the plaintiffs.

Fifth: That plaintiffs have such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable, including plaintiffs' costs and disbursements herein laid out and expended as to any appearing defendants.

King, Circuit Judge for Curry County, Oregon, which Order was signed, dated and entered on the 18th day of October, 1949, directing publication to be made in the Brookings-Harbor Pilot once a week for four consecutive and successive weeks. Date of first publication October 20, 1949, and date of last publication November 17, 1949.

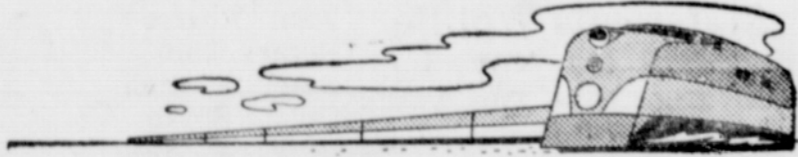
