Frank Reynolds, speaker for the afternoon, was accompanied by his wife and Mr. McDonald and Mr. Scully of the regional forestry office. Frank Reynolds is an extensive owner of timberland in Del Norte and Mendocino counties and makes his permanent home up Rowdy Creek canyon. He is a member of the California State Forest Board and is particularly interested in replanting and reseeding redwood trees and in the young growth of forest lands and the protection of the trees now growing from fire and insects. He read an article in the Forestry Magazine, by W. S. Rosecrans, which contained far too much meat for this small snack of a column, but condensing his talk to a mere sentence or two, we can say that over a period of years, co-operation and education of the general public, the stock and lumbermen with the California State Forest Board is achieving results in protecting the valuable watershed and saving the trees.
