"Shopping at Home" is theme of an advertisement elsewhere in this issue. This appeal should be heeded, and there are many reasons for this statement, I can assure you. Let me assert that any profit locally, will be spent locally, for improvement of the entire area. That alone should be sufficient reason.

America was founded on the profit system—and for that very reason has become as great as it is in the world. No one could afford not to make a profit if he wished to serve the public long.

With rare exceptions, I have noticed, through my exchanges, our prices in this area are in line. Frankly, I believe they are equitable to most any place, off transcontinental railroads. Certainly, those communities off the national carriers of freight, must pay for that freight—this area is, you must remember, at the end of the line.

Oddly enough, I have noticed that prices in Brookings are not far out of line with Portland—there at the rail terminal, right in the midst of wholesale houses and stockyards. Figure closely, you doubt this, then add about a dollar and a half a hundred for freight, and see if this statement is wrong in any way.

In the three-odd years I have been associated with the business men of this area, I have found that without exception, they endeavor to serve their customers as well as any merchant anywhere in the state. Californians, just across the line will vouch for this statement—because they do not like to pay the sales tax of that state.

Shopping at home wherever possible will mean that next year this community will have the benefit of that profit, which will be spent for improvement of the area—lost, that profit goes to de-

velop other communities, never to return here in any form. Best you think carefully before making shopping trips out of here.

After assisting the community in obtaining a resuscitator, the Rotary club, last Thursday evening voted to buy a "Jungle Jim" unit for the grade school playground, thus adding to the quite inadequate equipment of the local schools. Tennis courts will be added to the high school side as soon as ways and means are discovered to finance the project.

Landscaping of the school area has been taken by the Azalea Garden club as a project for the year. That, in itself, is not an easy one—it will require plenty of co-operation from everyone in the area, if asked. These women have a reputation for doing "the better things."

When accomplished, certain the area will point with bursting pride to the schools, which have been a source of controversy in the area for many years. With adequate equipment, purchased by the district and supplemented by the Rotary Club, nothing is likely to be missed

Last year, this area acquired another state park, Loeb, largely through the untiring efforts of Azalea Garden Club, which, in my way of thinking is one of the most public-spirited I have ever seen in my almost thirty-eight years experience in newspaper work. Watch this work progress, once started.

East; Thence along road 147 feet North 13 deg. 30 min. East; Thence along road 500.0 feet North 6 deg. 00 min. West; Thence along road 290.0 feet North 9 deg. 00 min. East; Thence 196 feet due West to place of beginning, Curry County, Oregon.

or any part or portion thereof, for the purpose of submitting the same to the judicial determination of the Court.

Second: That the plaintiffs are the owners in fee simple of said real property and the whole thereof.

Third: That none of said defendants has any interest or estate, right, title, or lien upon or in said real property, or any portion thereof paramount to the plaintiffs right, title and interest therein and thereto.

Fourth: That said defendants and each and all of them and all persons claiming under, by or through them, or any of them, be forever barred, restrained and en-

joined from asserting any claim whatever in or to said premises adverse to the plaintiffs.

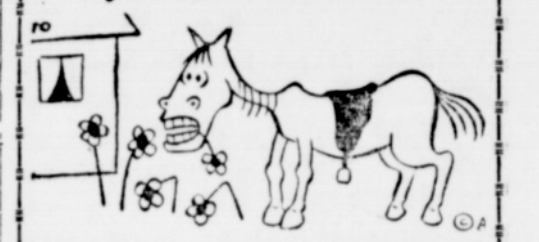
Fifth: That plaintiffs have such other and further relief as the Court may deem equitable, including plaintiffs' costs and disbursements herein laid out and expended as to any appearing defendants.

King, Circuit Judge for Curry County, Oregon, which Order was signed, dated and entered on the 18th day of October, 1949, directing publication to be made in the Brookings-Harbor Pilot once a week for four consecutive and successive weeks. The answers to everyday Insurance Problems

Question: My daughter has a saddle horse which is usually stabled at a riding club but which we recently kept overnight in our back yard. The horse got out of the yard and damaged a neighbor's yard and garden. We've paid for the damage but I understand there is an insurance policy which would protect us from having to pay damages of this kind in the future. Can you tell me about this policy?

Answer: The type of insurance you have in mind is called Comprehensive Personal Liability and it covers the acts of the person insured and those of his family, including all minor children. You are also protected from damages resulting from acts of your dogs, horses or other animals. It is an excellent policy and none should be without the protection it affords.
