

Free X-Ray Offered Everyone In Area, Tuesday, Nov. 15

A Free chest X-ray is offered every person, 15 years of age or older, Mrs. Bertha Whirry, local chairman, told the Pilot, Monday.

By re-checking every year, the early stages of tuberculosis can be quickly recognized and can be treated. Other chest conditions may be revealed by the X-ray.

Persons who have not been contacted through the mail to register, may sign up on the forms provided at Chetco Store, Brookings Market and at the post offices in Brookings and Harbor.

The X-ray takes but a minute, Mrs. Whirry said. Paper capes will be provided at the unit, since it is necessary to remove clothing to the waist.

This survey can be made to be 100% if everyone would but lay aside a few minutes of his time to check his chest.

Let's make this annual event, Mrs. Whirry concluded. The unit will be at the Central building, Nov. 15, from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. and from 2 p. m. to 6 p. m.
