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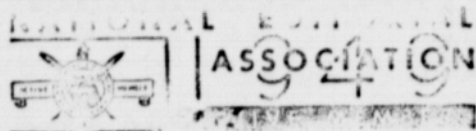
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IT SEEMS TO ME:

Question: While on a fishing trip last fall, I was casting and accidentally snagged a friend in the back of the neck. The hook had to be cut out and though the wound was painful, it wasn't at first serious.
