Co. Service Offices Reports To You:

Veterans with service-connected disabilities of 50 per cent should start immediately to gather vital records in order to establish eligibility for dependency allowance benefits authorized by recent congressional action, the Oregon department of veterans' affairs advised this week.

Until now, only veterans with service-connected disabilities rated 60 per cent or greater, have been entitled to allowances for their dependents. The new law extends these allowances to veterans with service-connected disabilities as low as 50 per cent.

The monthly allowances for war-disabled veterans with 100 percent disability—in addition to their own personal compensation, are \$21 for a wife, \$35 for a wife and child, \$45.50 for a wife and two children, \$56 for a wife and three or more children, \$14 for a child but no wife, \$24.50 for two children, \$35 for three or more children, \$17.50 for a dependent parent and \$35 for two dependent parents. A veteran with a 50 per cent rating would receive half of the top rates. Veterans compensated for peacetime service disabilities receive 80 per cent of the applicable wartime amount.

New beneficiaries of this act are urged to contact the county service officer for more expeditious handling of the application in obtaining records of births—of marriage, and of divorces, and deaths involving previous marriages. Such records must be in the veterans administration files before new payments can start.

Working through your service officer will enable you to obtain all certifications more promptly, and in most cases without cost. Phone 343, or write if unable to call at office.
