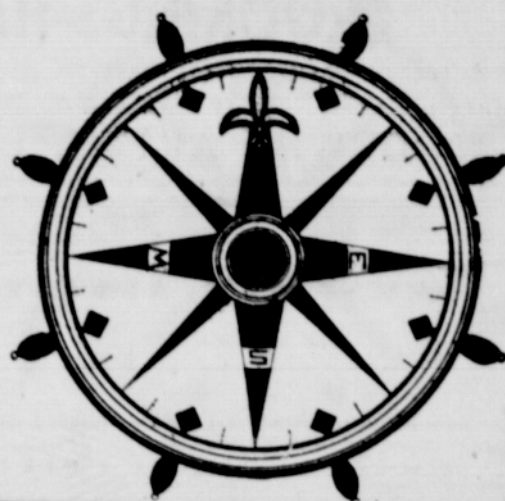

## Darlene Morris Completes Course On Tropical Disease

LOMA LINDA, Calif. — Miss Darlene Morris, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Morris, completed a course in tropical diseases at the Loma Linda, Calif., School of Tropical and Preventive Medicine, last week in connection with her nurse's course.

Miss Morris was one of 24 junior nursing students of the Collegiate School of Nursing of Loma Linda who heard the lectures of Dr. Bruce Halstead, medical zoologist of the school of tropical medicine.

"Students were given an insight into problems of public health nursing in tropical countries and what preventive measures can be taken to aid and educate the populace. The extreme conditions present in the tropics make them ideal for study, in that they help the students to grasp the potential dangers present in the semi-tropical areas of the United States. The course is given as an incentive to serve in the field of public health," concluded Mrs. Kathryn Nelson, dean of the nursing school.

Miss Morris will graduate in June of 1951.

Under the new arrangement, Mr. Panzer will have charge of the local greenhouses, and all the growing operations of the firm. Mr. Grootendorst, long in the export and wholesale end of floral business, will devote his entire time to that phase of the business, hoping to make Brookings famous all over the nation by his wholesale and export business from this area.

Mr. and Mrs. Panzer, their son, Freddie, 13; and daughter, Way, 6, will live in the Grootendorst house, near Baptist Community church, formerly occupied by the Grootendorst family. The Panzers are moving into their new home this week.

Will Visit In Europe.

Mr. and Mrs. Grootendorst expect to leave next Monday, by plane, for an extended visit to their old home in Holland. Mr. Grootendorst will return about Christmas time, while Mrs. Grootendorst will remain for another month or so.

Mr. and Mrs. Grootendorst and family left Holland in 1939, just before Hitler invaded Poland, and later Holland and Belgium. In 1945 they came to the United States, settling in Michigan for a time, before buying the local greenhouse and business. This is their first real visit to their old home since before the war.

While away, Mr. and Mrs. Grootendorst will look for new opportunities and novelties in plants, to be raised here. They expect, also, to establish national and foreign contacts for export.

While they are gone, the twin boys, Henry and Edward, will remain with Mr. and Mrs. Panzer.
