School Census 28 Over Last Year

The annual school census, just completed, includes 256 boys and 194 girls, or a total of 450 between the ages of 4 and 20, said Lynn O. Hampton, superintendent, Monday morning.

This is an increase of 28 over last year. In this number there were 47 seven years of age (second grade) and 40 six years old (first grade).

This year, this number is being cared for by a schedule of one first grade, one second grade and a combined first and second grade room. Since the new building has only eight class rooms, the eighth grade is being taught in the high school building.

If the present population remains the same, said Mr. Hampton, there would be 118 pupils in high school in 1953, 127 in 1955, and 155 in 1957.

Present high school enrollment is 93 and grade school, 247.

Fr. Don Denman Rotary Speaker, Tuesday Noon

Fr. Don Denman, parish priest of the local Catholic church, reviewed the book: "You Can Change the World," by Father Keller, at the noon luncheon of Brookings Rotary Club, Tuesday.

"People lose sight of the fact that Democracy and Christianity are synonymous," said Fr. Denman, in his opening statement. "Many people are wondering just where we are going. In the past few years, we have seen nations rise and fall, we have seen Communism spread like a disease."

"Father Keller wrote his book to counteract evil tendencies. He asserted that man had reduced itself almost to the level of animal, through his material atheism. Communism is but one phase of this sinking to this level. In this country there are plenty of evidences."

"There is a Christopher movement, non-sectarian, where people pledge themselves to do their best to help others, without any regard to self. This movement is easily defined and may be seen practiced by many in this nation, who practice the principles of Christianity."

"Our forefathers, those who wrote our Declaration of Independence, our Constitution, were religious men. They made this country what it is today through these two documents. Only under these two documents can man, as an individual, do anything to change the world."

"We can accomplish this feat if each of us as individuals do our individual part, without regard for self, but for the good of the most people."

"Democracy and Christianity are inseparable," said Fr. Denman, in closing.
