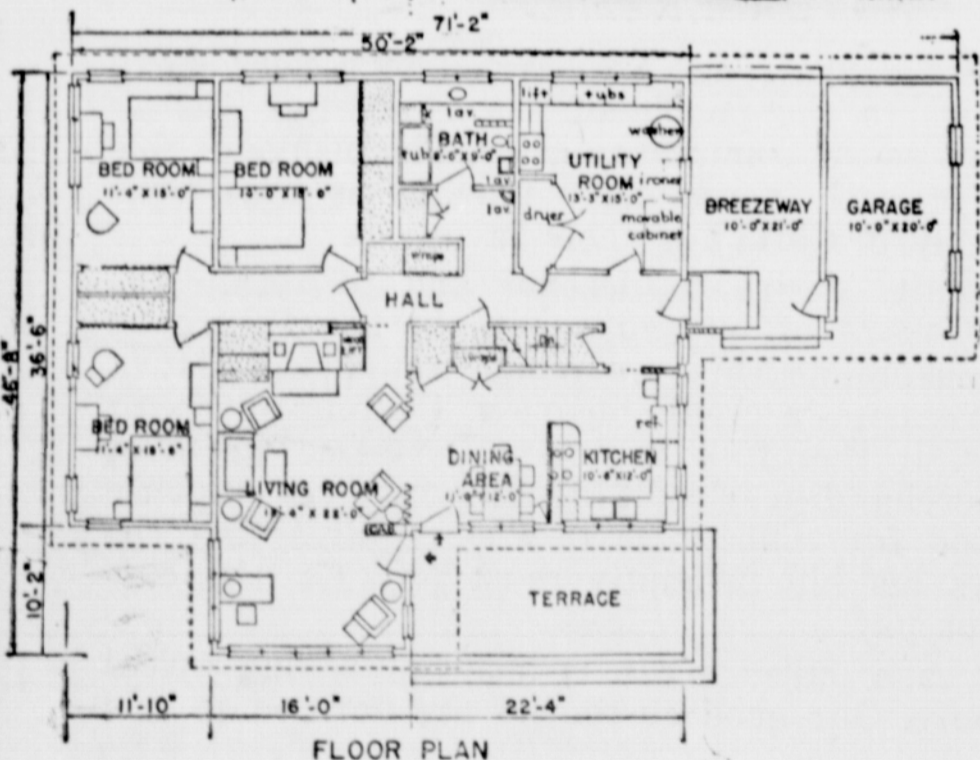

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Streamlined For Modern Living



This popularly styled one-story farmhouse is tailor-made for Oregon. A four-foot overhang protects the front entrance, and a breezeway connecting garage and house offers the same protection for the back door. It also affords a covered area for hanging clothes during rainy weather.

This farmhouse has that attractive "rambling" look but close study of the floor plan will show that none of its 1,990 square feet of floor area is wasted for beauty's sake alone.

You can start this farmhouse with one bedroom and without the garage and breezeway. Use the space for the two bedrooms as a temporary carport, and when the second and third bedrooms are added, build the breezeway and garage.

Features of the house include a central hall connecting all rooms; bedroom wardrobe closets; a front door facing the farm drive; abundant storage; and a terrace level with the inside floor which may be used for summertime meals or a children's play area. The "L" shaped

living-dining area offers flexibility in room arrangement as well as being handy when large groups are entertained. The "U" shaped kitchen is separated from the dining area by a wall of pass cupboards.

The utility room is located across from the kitchen and between the bathroom and outdoor breezeway. Either a partial or full basement may be constructed; if no basement is desired, the stair space may be used for a first floor storage wall.

Room dimensions are designed to waste a minimum of lumber and windows are spaced between studs. Four sheets of working drawings may be ordered from the Oregon Farmhouse Plan Service, Oregon State college, for \$1.35. Plans show frame construction. Ask for plan number 145.

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
