

## Wife Should Know About Husband's Business, Affairs

Married men often work hard to accumulate an estate to protect their families but wives are not always as well equipped as they should be to handle it, says "Changing Times," the Kiplinger Magazine, in its December issue.

A woman handling money must make some decisions herself. She will be in a better position to decide if her husband keeps her posted on his financial affairs.

A wife should be familiar with each of the following subjects:

Who are her husband's advisers—his lawyer, his life insurance agent and the person he would want her to consult about financial matters?

Is there a will? If so, who gets what? If there is no will, the amount a wife receives depends on the state's laws.

Life insurance. A wife should know how much insurance her husband carries, the number of policies and the purpose of each. If the policies provide a lump sum she should know how she should invest the money.

What is the family's financial status? What are the sources of the husband's income, how much comes in, how much goes out, how much is retained as savings?

What property or securities do the husband or family own? A wife should know the approximate market value of each of the items. What real estate agent or broker would her husband recommend?

In some cases, if the husband is in business for himself a wife should be able to carry on the business. If he is in a partnership, the wife should know of any agreement to buy or sell the business.

Cash in an emergency. The widow might need money for hospital bills, estate taxes or other expenses. She should know of any method worked out to get her the money.

Where are the records and papers kept? A wife should know the location of life insurance policies, stocks, birth records, deeds, etc., preferably in a safe deposit box.

A family is a sort of enterprise engaged in the business of living, says "Changing Times." If a family is to function smoothly through every emergency, a wife must know a good deal of her husband's financial affairs.
