This book, published annually by the secretary of state at Salem, at a cost to you of only 50c. It is a bargain book and a gold mine of information. Put it on the shelf with the World Almanac, the home medicine book, Webster's dictionary and the Bible, for once you become familiar with it, you will refer to it many times. Within the 372 pages are continued a history of Oregon, articles on geology, agriculture, state parks, conservation, departments and salaries paid to state and the federal officials. There is even a beautiful picture of a lily field at Brookings, showing Amber Campbell among the flowers.

Do you know the words to the state song? Do you know the specific sources of revenue of the local and state governments?

What are some of the newspapers and publications of Oregon? If you need aid of some kind for your children, do you know where to turn? Who is the director of the travel information department of the state highway department? What of the John Day irrigation project? Somewhere in this book is a piece of information which you need to know. You cannot live in Oregon and not have it so.
