

Rural School Board Sets Tentative Plans For Budget Committees To Follow

GOLD BEACH—Curry County Rural School District Board has set the date of Wednesday, Jan. 4, 1950, for a meeting to receive suggestions for budget policies for 1950-51. The meeting will be held at the court room at 8:00 p. m. The public is invited.

The Rural School Board has set the following policies on a tentative basis and offers them for the consideration of school board members and budget committee members.

General Control—

1. Eliminate teachers acting as district clerks.
2. Set forth following salary scale for clerks:
 - \$75.00 per teacher up to three teachers.
 - \$40.00 per teacher, from 3-7 teachers.
 - \$20.00 per teacher above seven teachers.
3. Census—
 - \$5.00 minimum.
 - 15c per name for first 200 census names and 10c per name over 200.
4. Legal Service: \$25.00 maximum for Clerk's bond.

Instruction—

1. Personal service: The rural school board is considering salary schedule changes.
2. Supplies: Some formula for per pupil basis to be adopted as policy.
3. Textbooks: Some formula per pupil basis to be adopted as policy.

4. Tuition: Tuition must be charged for non-resident pupils and be shown under estimated receipts.

Operation of Plant—

1. Janitor's salaries: Standardizing janitor's salary is being considered.
2. Janitor's supplies: No increase over previous year's budget without sufficient justification.

Maintenance and Repair—

1. Furniture and Equipment: Policy to be established on basis of student enrollment.
2. Buildings and Grounds: Establish policy of a certain sum based on enrollment.

Auxiliary Agencies—

- Health: First aid supplies to be allowed on basis of standards required by state.
2. Transportation: Supplies allowed on mileage basis. Buses not to operate in isolated areas where it would be more feasible to pay parents a reasonable sum to transport students to the end of the bus route.
3. Lunch program: The same policy as 1949-50 will be followed.

Capital Outlay—

1. New Sites: Not allowed on county equalized budget.
2. New buildings: Not allowed on county equalized budget.
3. Major Alterations: Not allowed on county equalized budget.
4. New furniture and equipment: Same as 1949-50 policy.
5. Library Books: Same as 1949-50 policy.

Debt Service—

Interest on indebtedness and bond charges not allowed on the county equalized budget.

Emergency—

1. Same schedule as 1949-50. The above budget items are listed as suggested tentative policies and are offered for consideration. The rural school board will willingly accept any suggestions for changes and will adopt definite policies after hearing suggestions at the January 4 meeting.

The rural board is made up of Charles W. Brooks, Sixes, chairman; C. M. Grey, vice-chairman, Ophir; Don Donaldson, Denmark; C. H. Young, Gold Beach and Mrs. Mabel McVay, Harbor.

Don't Let The "Ads" Deceive YOU!

After we read the advertisements in our newspapers and magazines, it is the "Men of Distinction" that drink. Always are the "Men of Distinction" portrayed in very beautiful clothes. The deceitful thing about such an advertisement is the fact men who drink are not always found beautifully clad and attired. Here is a challenge to the social drinker:

A TEST FOR SOCIAL DRINKERS

1. Do you take a drink as a matter of course before dinner or lunch every day?
2. Do you always drink at parties where alcohol is served?
3. Do you, rather often, drink to relax?
4. Do you, rather often, drink for a "lift or pick-up?"
5. Do you drink to feel less self-conscious or more at ease when you are out socially?
6. Do you take a drink to help you sleep?
7. Do you, ever purposely or unconsciously, drink "too" much over a week-end or holiday?
8. Do you get irritable after two or three drinks?
9. Do you feel happier after two or three drinks?
10. When you are away from home, do you drink at hotels, and restaurants in order not to feel bored or lonely?
11. Do you ever spend money extravagantly after having had a drink or so?
12. Do you ever drive a car after drinking . . . "even" one beer?
13. Are you certain that your drinking, by example or otherwise, has no ill effects on any other person?

All social drinkers, light, moderate, or heavy, should definitely ask themselves why they drink and why they feel they need a drink. To be absolutely on the safe side of alcohol, every social drinker should be able to answer, "No," to the foregoing.
