Editor, Pilot: I am enclosing a resolution that was passed at the last meeting of the Curry County Pomona Grange, which is supposed to be sent to the two county papers for publication. It is more for the Rogue River than for this end of the county but I believe everyone is interested in it. — Kathryn Reekman, Secretary.

"Whereas: the tourist trade in Curry County is a very vital factor in the economy of the county; and

Whereas: the biologists from the State Game Commission are recommending a cut in the season's catch of Spring Chinook salmon on the Rogue River to one fish a day and five during the season; and

Whereas: the only thing that has been done to increase the run of Spring Chinook is to cut the season and cut the catch per season; and

Whereas: we have every reason to expect some large runs in the future as the result of screens placed on irrigation ditches in 1946-47-48 with the Chinook thus saved returning in 1950-51-52; therefore

Be It Resolved: that Curry County Pomona Grange in regular session, Jan. 1, 1950, respectively recommend that there be no cut in the limit of catch for Spring Chinooks as we feel that it is not necessary at this time, and would seriously affect the economy of the county; and be it further

Resolved: that hatcheries be established as soon as possible to hatch Spring Chinooks to be placed in the Rogue River.

Food Handlers Cards Required

Starting Jan. 1, 1950, the Curry County Health Department will issue food handlers' cards to all persons working in restaurants, or other food and drink establishments. This is in compliance with Oregon Laws relating to Public Health, and the State of Oregon Sanitary Code.

It will be necessary to (1) Show a negative serology test from your private physician (2) Show a negative chest X-ray.

These cards will be good for one year from the date issued. You may obtain your cards at the office of the Health Department, Gold Beach, or upon request, they may be mailed.

Dr. Raymond Erickson will hold office hours in Brookings, January 18: hours 10 a. m. to 12 noon for food handlers examinations. P. M. hours as usual. W. A. CARTWRIGHT, M. D. County Health Officer.
