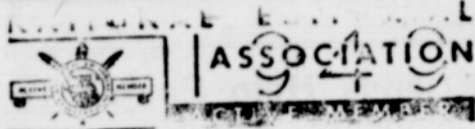
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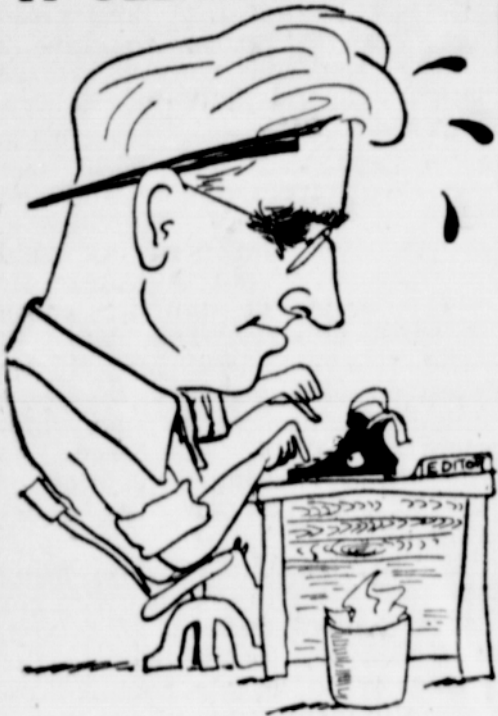
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IT SEEMS TO ME:

Hampel said that this nation must whip Russia by the same tactics Russia is trying to undermine this nation—by having a network of spies in that country to cause the ignorant Russians to revolt against a regime which ultimately will mean their death. True, it is no easy task, but it can be done—but only at a cost—and a lot of secrecy.

Better to prepare this nation for such an eventuality, let us all produce as we have never in the past done, let us create in this nation a unity which has never been needed more than at present. Let's consolidate our internal squabble and toss it into a pile for some future time, and put up a united front.

In times of trouble, as we all can remember during the recent war, we must have a faith, one in another. We must all be "on the same team," follow leadership that is above reproach—that, as I see it, is our goal at present.

People are questioning movements destined to plan defense of the west coast, now being practiced by Canada and United States, in case Alaska were invaded. Some are becoming panicky, without reason, perhaps.

Really, war is nearer than any of us like to admit. Russia, in her attempt to conquer the globe has laid plans to first take or destroy the United States, or so cripple the states that they may have free rein in the attempted conquest of the remainder of the world.

What does this mean to us, in Curry county? To me it has but one pattern—we quit in 1945 without having completed the job, just as the country did in 1918 without accomplishing victory. The world today, it seems to me, is more explosive in nature than Sept. 1, 1939, when Hitler marched in Poland without resistance.

We have been reading about Fuch's surrendering to Russia the secrets of the hydrogen bomb for the paltry sum of four hundred dollars. Others, right in this country are ready to do likewise at a smaller figure. I recall a few statements made last week by Carl Hampel in his address to the Rotary club, "It's nearer than we wish to think."

I am wondering if Stalin is not trying to time his invasion, or threatened invasion to match the "Holy Year," of the Catholic church, for psychological reasons. This has been a thought with me for some time. I have no basis, particularly for this remark, but the thought struck me, and I can't rid myself of it.

Carl Hampel told us at Rotary meeting last Tuesday that he could "see" Russia striking at us by way of Alaska. Certainly we have seen the expenditures of many millions in way of defenses in that section in recent years. However, if I am correct, we do not have anything there that will commence to stop Russia's advance through that section.

I am not panicky, but I champ at the "bit" to see the congress argue over petty things and permit our defenses to rot at the core. Proof of this may be seen in the recent navy department fights in congress.

There has been a lot of talk around Washington during the last several months about Republican party being dead. We members of Congress who spend some of our time at home know differently, but it has looked that in this city populated by administration payrollees. Recently, however, the Republicans staged a big Lincoln Day party here. Everyone was surprised, including the Republicans, when 12,000 people crowded into the hall and another estimated 3,000 were turned away for lack of room. There has been considerable optimism in Republican circles here since that event.

Under the heading of "now it can be told," I can reveal the fact that I had considerable to do with the drafting the recently published statement of principles and objectives of the Republican party. Representative Joe Martin, Republican minority leader of the house, asked me to be a member of a three-man drafting committee. After drafting our own version we met with the three members of the senate drafting group and with representatives of the Republican national committee and hammered out a final consolidating draft which was approved and released. It was an interesting experience for me and I feel that the job we turned out was a pretty good one. One thinks about the recent Republican statement which is different from most platform documents is that it contains 23 short, positive statements under the several headings which recite in plain language what the Republicans propose to do when they are voted into power. and definite short statements are set out by themselves they represent an effective answer to the question: "Why don't the Republicans tell us what they do stand for?"

Obviously there is nothing startling or new in the recent Republican statement. Its chief value lies in the fact that it is a short summary of what we have been saying. It seems to me the only serious failure of the Republican party is its inability to get its actions and its philosophy properly and accurately publicized. We have been a little bit like the fellow who winks at his girl in the dark. He knows what he is doing but no one else does. I hope the party statement which I helped create will do a little toward curing this situation.

The house during this session of Congress has been plagued with poorly drawn and ill-considered legislation coming to the floor. It has also been frustrated by delaying tactics. The postal rate increase bill passed recently was a jumble of bad guesses on how to raise more revenue and was amended on the floor to such an extent that few members knew what was in it when the final vote came. The bill to aid Korea first came to the floor with the declaration that \$120 millions were required. It was rejected by a close vote. Warmed over it was brought back and passed for half that amount.

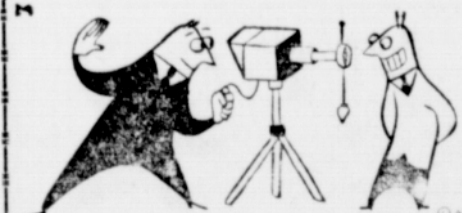

Question. My hobby is photography and during the past several years I've accumulated equipment worth quite a respectable sum of money. I've always listed the equipment in my regular Residence Theft insurance but when I recently purchased a rather expensive camera, I was told it would be a good idea to take out a special camera insurance policy. Can you tell me how to go about this?

Answer. So long as your photography is of the amateur variety, it would be better to continue under your residence theft policy. If you will make sure that the "theft away from the premises" clause is included and that your particularly valuable pieces of equipment are individually insured for their full value in the policy, you'll have pretty complete protection.
