Sunday morning Harold tried the shoes on Hapenny—a perfect fit. She spent the rest of the morning cavorting around the field performing just about every antic but a somersault, to show her pleasure at being outdoors again and free from pain.

Cite Need For Local Episcopal Church

In report to the Oregon headquarters of Episcopal church the Rt. Rev. Thomas Jenkins of Port Orford, formerly Bishop of Nevada, but now retired, expressed the hope that the Bishop of Oregon co-operate with the local people by assisting them in the construction of a larger and a more adequate church in Brookings.

Bishop Jenkins state that this place, where some five years ago the church opened work, is a thriving community, now widely engaged in timber and lumbering and lily bulb culture. It and industrially engaged in lumber has good schools. The population is scattered over a fairly wide area. It offers a good field for the church, but there is a need for an adequate combination building suitable for both worship and a youth center.

Services at Brookings are being conducted by the Vicar of a lot which was offered to the St. Matthew's, Gold Beach. A tiny chapel has been placed on church in a public-spirited manner by Elmer Bankus, provided the group build a suitable and creditable church.

"I am hopeful," says Bishop Jenkins, "that we can quickly get to work in co-operation with the local people and put up the first unit of which will ultimately be a church building, with an adequate place of worship as well as parish and community hall."
