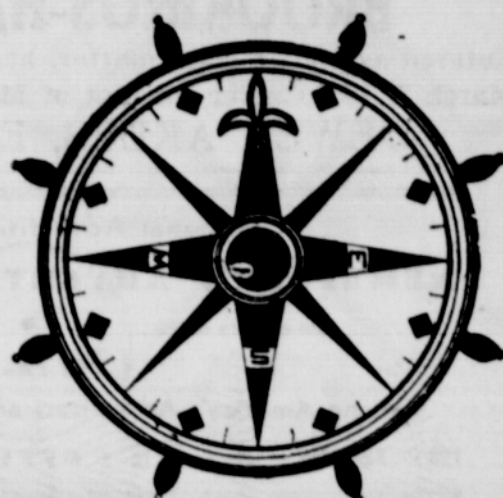

## "Great Books" Club Will Be Started Here

"Death must be good, because it is universal," so opined Plato, ancient Greek philosopher, whose works will be studied locally by a group to be organized Friday, March 3, at the high school when "Great Books" study course will be launched locally. W. H. Hibbard will be leader at the first meeting.

Designed as four-year course, "Great Books" is a product of a board centering around Robert M. Hutchins, president of the University of Chicago. The discussion from this group is meant to create enjoyment for the members; to help them understand themselves; to understand the world as it is today; to become interesting persons; to build an individual philosophy; to rise out of the commonplace; and to become great conversationalists.

These aims will be open to all who wish to join; irrespective of educational background. Discussion panels will be directed by a series of booklets or pamphlets, costing \$9.60 for the year. The group functions best when 20 to 40 people enroll, the experience shows.

A sample of the year's discussion for the first year includes:

1. Declaration of Independence; the Old Testament (1 Kings 21; 2 Samuel, 11 and 12).
3. Plato: Apology, Crito.
3. Plato: Republic, Books 1 and 2;
4. Thucydides: History, Selections;
5. Aristophanes: Lysistrata, Birds, Clouds;
6. Aristotle: Ethics, Book 1;
7. Aristotle, Politics, Book 1;
8. Plutarch: 'Lycurgus,' 'Numa,' 'Alexander,' 'Caesar.'

These great philosophies are a basic reading for what is hoped by many to become one of the most enlightening evenings of the month, once this club gets to functioning.
