First meeting of club formed to read "Great Books," met at the high school last Friday evening to organize and lay plans for future conduct of meetings. The next meeting has been set for Friday, March 17, at the high school, with an appeal to others to come and enjoy one of the most profitable two hours that can be spent.

Some people, it has been said, were scared out of joining the group because the names of the books sounded too much like a college library. This fact is refuted by those who seek to establish this group, on the basis that the sole intent of this new club is merely "an invitation to thinking." Philosophies, as established hundreds of years ago by these men, have never been changed as of today.

Through membership in this group, people are taken on adventures into these great minds of yesteryear, better to understand fully the problems of today fast-moving world.

It was pointed out last Fri-

day that few citizens of the U. S. really understood and fewer have read the Declaration of Independence.

Learning in this course is accomplished by this manner: To read a series of pamphlets designed for quick scanning, and to discuss, through a series of questions, vital points. It really is not required that the person have a formal education to become a member and fully enjoy this plan of study. Only requirement necessary is a willingness to learn more about philosophy.

A leader and an assistant leader conduct meetings something on the order of "Town Hall" meetings over the radio, which has become one of America's popular program. No issues will be decided, nor any attempt to alter or decide. It is not likely that personal opinions will be changed, except for a better understanding.

Cost of the pamphlets are \$9.60 for a year's study, with one set being used in a family. Meetings will be held bi-monthly, first on Friday, March 17 at 8 p. m.
