"Our commercially enriched flours have no actual food value added, research revealed. Our commercially advertised and recommended vitamins come under the same category, and people go blissfully on believing they get the daily requirements at all times.
"Babies, despite the belief of adults, by instinct can come a lot nearer choosing the foods actually needed than their parents. They crave certain foods, when needed, and repulse them when not needed. Animals follow this plan, too.
"Commercially canned fruits and vegetables have been ruined for food value in too many instances. By-products of so many manufacturing processes have a cash value higher than the product manufactured. From this, we note our national magazines running large ads depicting tempting foods, to sell the products which there seems to be an oversupply. This is not true of the by-products, which have long since been sold.
"Diseases, when proper diets are maintained, seem to vanish almost immediately in so many
