

Washington Boys Roll Car Over; Get Picked Up For It

LANGLOIS—Two Vancouver, Wash., youth were arrested here Thursday morning after they had wrecked a stolen automobile near the cheese factory. Their arrest ended a 16-mile chase at 80 miles an hour along Hwy 101 in southern Coos and northern Curry counties.

The chase began north of Bandon, near the Bear Creek store, when state police officer, Louie Turnbow, attempted to stop a late model Buick sedan driven by the two boys, age 16 and 17. The boys took off at a high rate of speed and Officer Turnbow followed them.

Turnbow said the boys were traveling at more than 80 miles when the car went off the road near the cheese factory. The car rolled over four times and then landed on its wheels. The boys, apparently unhurt, jumped out. One ran toward the cheese factory and was caught by Al Berger, an employe. The other swam across the chilly Floras Creek but was persuaded to swim back by Dick Bartlow, owner of the feed store near the factory who had no gun.

Coquille state police headquarters checked with Vancouver to learn that the car had been taken from a garage there Wednesday night. The boys are being held in the juvenile ward of the county jail pending word from Vancouver.

The police are now looking for men who looted the car of some tools after it had been towed to the garage.
