**Plan A Kitchen?
Check Data On It**

If you are planning a new kitchen, you should take in consideration the results of considerable studying that had been made by manufacturers and government agencies in various sections of the country.

All of these studies have resulted in a U-shaped kitchen, planned primarily for the farm home and guaranteed to be more convenient and mean fewer steps for the farm wife than any other type. This kitchen calls for the sink in the base of the U with work space on either side, allowing at least 36 inches for the mixing table to the right of the sink. On the right side of the U facing the bottom is a refrigerator, while the range is on the left side. This permits the housewife to work from right to left and extensive studies have proven that this is the more convenient and step-saving.

Complete details on this modern kitchen are available from the Office of Information of the United States Department of Agriculture in Washington, D. C. Ask for miscellaneous publication 646, "A Step-saving New Kitchen." If you merely want a working drawing, one will be available from your state extension service.

**Electric Ranges
Easy To Clean**

Cleaning an electric range offers no great problem, for electricity is the cleanest of all fuels. We are including a few hints which will make the job of prolonging life of your range even more simple.

The following precautions should be observed in cleaning all electric ranges:

1. See that all switches are on the "off" position before starting to clean the range.
2. Do not use abrasives or other cleaning materials that will scratch.
3. Do not immerse electrical units in water. If for any reason these units become damp in cleaning, be sure that they are dry before they are again used.
4. Do not clean surface units while hot.
5. Always soften hardened foods before removing as unnecessary scraping may damage any type of surface.

The exterior of a good quality range is finished in porcelain and can be cleaned in the following manner: Let porcelain finished surfaces cool before cleaning.

Wipe up spots as soon as possible. If porcelain is warm, use a dry cloth, never a wet one. When porcelain is cool, wipe with a damp soapy cloth, rinse and dry well. Avoid using gritty soaps or acid.

**I WRITE AS I
SEE IT!**

Translated into English Loma Linda would be called the "Hill Beautiful." Loma Linda is a big hill rising up from a sea of orange groves, located about six miles from San Bernardino, California. It is an orderly, clean, well-kept little city of about 3000 population.

It is a Seventh-Day Adventist center of education. The College of Medical Evangelists and its numerous institutions are located here. One of these auxiliary institutions is a 165-bed sanitarium. This institution is modern in every respect and is staffed by the most skillful medical help obtainable. This week we shall direct our attention chiefly to this sanitarium and its work.

The business section of town is owned and operated by the sanitarium. There are numerous well-stocked stores, especially is the market one of the show places of the country. Tobacco in any form, and alcoholic beverages of any kind are not obtainable in any of these mercantile concerns. There are no butcher shops in Loma Linda. The sanitarium operates a 500-acre farm, fully-equipped with dairy, poultry plant and numerous other well-organized farm activities. The institution is operated as an average 95% capacity.

A strong religious atmosphere envelops the varied activities of the concern. The study of the Scriptures and prayer are everywhere in evidence. It is not uncommon to see the chaplain in company with a group of praying men, gather about the bedside of a patient for the purpose of carrying out the New Testament instruction as recorded in James 5:14-15: "Is there any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church; and yet them play over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord: And the prayer of faith shall save the sick; and if any hath committed sins, they shall be forgiven him."

It was our privilege a few evenings ago to witness this service in action. A very sick man had been brought in from a distance. Death was not far away and immediate attention was essential. The medical help were doing all they could for him, but still his condition grew more and more critical. He, with his wife and children assembled at his bedside, called for the men of prayer.

Kneeling at his bedside we prayed while the chaplain anointed his forehead with the oil. The medical attendants gave reverent attention, though busy administering a blood transfusion. In hopeful unison these men and women of medical experience and skill were seen working hand in hand with the ministers of Christ in bringing relief to the afflicted and sick.

Speaking for myself: If I were to become afflicted with a serious sickness I would seek a place where those who administered to me were acquainted with power of prayer when applied in connection with skilled medical science in the treatment of the sick and afflicted.

Next time I shall attempt to write something about this really great medical college where students are trained to minister to the souls as well as the bodies of the sick.
