Red Cross Swim Program Explained

Wesley Stone, Red Cross field representative of San Francisco, explained the procedure involved in obtaining Red Cross swimming instruction to a group of interested people at the Grange hall Thursday evening.

- His suggestions were:
1. Brookings and Harbor work as a unit—this would naturally follow.
 2. Obtain as much volunteer help as possible from all the organizations.
 3. Someone in or near this area to be sent to a Red Cross instructors school for ten days.
 4. Preliminary survey of enrollment.
 5. Availability of bus service for children.
 6. Two or more representative persons to contact county Red Cross chairman, Dr. Cartwright, as to what financial aid might be given on this project.

Mr. Stone met with this group of people at the request of Mrs. Kathryn Reekman, chairman of the committee to investigate the possibility of obtaining a Red Cross swimming program for the southern part of the county by the Harbor Community club.
