

### Charges Continue In "Picnic Camps"

GRANTS PASS—The Forest Service will continue to make a small charge for public use of some of the larger national forest recreation areas, it was announced here this week though the forest service office.

Lyle F. Watts, chief of the forest service, stated that the charge is a continuation of the experimental policy started in 1949 and that it would be levied in some 50 to 60 of the largest public recreation areas where the conveniences and services justify a charge. The remainder of the 4,500 national forest camps and picnic areas will be free, as in the past.

The campgrounds and picnic areas for which a charge will be made in the national forests of Oregon and Washington. Those to which charges will be applied will be announced in advance of the summer camping season.

Charges will be the same as last year. Campers will pay 50c a day or \$3 a week for a car party of not more than six persons. Picknickers will pay from 25c to 50c for a party of not more than six.

Some charge areas will be operated by the forest service and some by concessionaires. Charge areas will be conspicuously posted and, in general, will be the

largest and best developed areas on national forests.

The continuation of the charge policy is desirable, Mr. Watts said, because last year's trial, when a charge was made at 50 areas, was not conclusive. He stated that the subcommittees on agricultural appropriations in both house and senate expressed the hope that the forest service would continue the experiment.

At areas operated by concessionaires, rates will be the same as those charged by the forest service. Concessionaires will pay the United States a small fee based on total income from the area.

Emotionalism appears to have so dominated the reporting and comment on the McCarthy statements that the real issue—the real problem—is obscure. Perhaps Senator McCarthy is to blame for the confused and emotional comment. He was mistaken, I think, in alleging or implying criminal acts on the part of the people he has named. It is extremely doubtful if charges of traitor, spy, or even of being a communist can be proven on anyone mentioned.

But what Senator McCarthy has shown pretty well documented is that certain people who either are now, or have recently been, in high places in our state department, have been closely identified with communist-minded people and groups. Such association is not a crime. Such association does, however, render those people undesirable employees of our state department.

No one, I am sure, will deny that communism is a threat to all free people. The world control of communism, the Russian government, is our enemy in the thing we call a cold war. We cannot, and should not, employ communist sympathizers in any department of our government—least of all the state department. We should not employ people about whom there is a reasonable basis of suspicion.

I think that is what Senator McCarthy is driving at, but he has trod on some important toes. The smoke screen of confusion was quickly developed. The sen-

ator's errors were quickly magnified. He stands almost alone against all the power and the brains of the executive department of the government.

The president has, in effect, designated the McCarthy statements as a whole school of red herrings. (He called the Alger Hiss charges red herrings. He has declined to allow the committee to inspect the state department loyalty records or the civil service commission loyalty records. Those files allegedly give the persons in question a clean bill of health. If so, what harm in seeing them? If so, why not open them up and clean up this whole mess?)

There is something wrong in some place. I hope Senator McCarthy will keep on until he is either discredited by clear-cut facts or forces the administration to clear the names of many people McCarthy has listed by showing the committee the files. The pro-administration news writers and commentators have ignored the fact that the President's action leaves many people "smeared" when the committee should publicly clear after inspection of the files.

Perhaps Senator McCarthy erred in listing any names, but the president makes the greater error by leaving them smeared instead of clearing them—if the files can clear them.
