Along Azalea Row

Paul DeBlock, landscape architect and artist, came to see us here at Weedy Acres and we ushered him quickly into the living room to show him the ocean view!

All of us being with children grown, we were soon launched into a discussion of educational methods.

Said Paul DeBlock in his forthright way, "One cannot learn to be a landscape architect in three months! I was seven years old

when I did my first grafting and propagating."

"I went to a rural school near Brussels, Belgium. There the principal had several acres for the use of the children attending school. Mornings we had our curriculum, and afternoons we devoted to agriculture and horticulture in the sunshine and the earth, itself.

"Belgium is a small country, intensely cultivated. Rural children learned agriculture as soon as they did their letters, or they were taught a trade. Only a few were admitted to the universities. After high school, boys went to work in factories as apprentices, the factory owner was allotted a certain number to train for which he received a subsidy from the government.

"The Ford factories in and about Detroit were always glad to get Belgian workmen so well trained, because of the thorough preparation. All a Belgian need to get a job as a skilled workman was to show his certificate."

At sixteen, Paul DeBlock put in his first lawn, professionally. This was in the city of Ghent. He came to Montreal, Canada, in 1911 where he did landscaping

about a huge hotel there.

Eleven years later Mr. and Mrs. DeBlock moved to Portland.

At that time, there were only 12 houses in Eastmoreland, and one could see the postman coming a half mile away. "Portland was good to me," said Paul DeBlock, "It is a city of homes and fine people. I had a successful business there, but my sons were growing up and I looked forward to retirement."

The DeBlocks fell in love with southern Curry county and in 1937 purchased substantial holdings near Pistol River, overlooking the ocean and not far from Mack Arch. "Nowhere else in Oregon," says Paul DeBlock, "is there such a climate or such beauty."

"There are nine distinct varieties of azaleas here, blooming almost the year around. Nowhere in the state can azaleas be grown with such beautiful color." He attributes it to the minerals in the soil.

He has added his own touch of beauty to our countryside. The Robert Swan home is a fine example of his abilities as a landscape architect. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Struebing are in process of a DeBlock transformation.

Paul DeBlock has an artist's eye for his work, plus years of training and experience. For the school landscaping he wants a planting to reduce maintenance to a minimum for the first ten years.

WHO CALLS HOOVER A 'YOKEL' and Why!

An Open Letter to S. Eugene Allen Editor of the Oregon Labor Press

Dear Gene:—It is common knowledge that no-one in the state of Oregon thinks less of Wayne Morse than you do. Time and again Joe Battaglia, Heinie Detloff and the others around the table at Hilaire's have heard you denounce Morse as a "commie" sympathizer and political racketeer.

Why, then have you used the old, familiar "commie" smear technique in the last two issues of the Oregon Labor Press calling Dave Hoover an illiterate and unintelligent "yokel?"

You know better, Gene. You know that Hoover has had three years of law training and is well informed on world and domestic problems. He takes short-hand fluently and is an expert typist.
