

Pelicans Massacred In Second Game, Sun., When Merchants Shut All Gates

The Crescent City Merchants continued their "hex" on Brookings by defeating the Pelicans for the second time at Crescent City, Sunday, this time by a 10 to 1 score.

Salvage started on the mound for the Pelicans and got by the first inning, one, two, three but the Merchants hopped onto him for seven hits and five runs in the second and third; Astin relieved him to start the last of the fourth and after retiring the first two batters, Knight slapped a long home run between left and center. Three walks and two hits in the sixth were good for two more runs, with only one out, proving that it was not Astin's "day" for pitching. Third baseman Jim Barrett then traded positions with Astin and retired the side.

Two hits and two walks off Barrett in the seventh gave the Merchants their final tally, with Barrett retiring the side in the eighth.

While the Pelicans touched

Templeton, Del Norte high school pitcher, for nine hits in seven innings, they were never able to bunch hits effectively. Four fast double plays on the part of the Merchants infield cut down several fine scoring opportunities.

Despite this second straight loss, the Pelicans give indications of developing into a good club, especially with the proposed addition of a first string catcher and first baseman. Lack of sufficient practice games is no doubt the Pels principal handicap.

League play starts next Sunday with the locals making the long trek to Myrtle Creek. First home game will be against Ashland on May 21, the Azalea Festival week-end. Box score:

When the Indians come from Smith River to the Azalea Festival, be sure to look carefully at the beads about their necks. These are wampum, or Indian money. They wear string upon string of peculiar, elongated beads, white, ivory or a pale rose in color. Some of the beads are delicately carved in designs, others decorated with tiny pieces of snake skin or the feathers of birds.

Resembling very much a miniature elephant tusk, about the size mice might have, if such a thing were possible, they present a mystery. What are the little beads, shells or some sea creature, bone or ivory, or something the white man has made and sold them—The Smith River Indians are vague, with a wave of the hand they indicate that wampum comes from the north some place. "Way off to the north—oh, maybe near the Siletz country."

Mrs. Vance Bolick who has long been interested in the Smith River Indians, has an Indian friend with a measuring stick tattooed from wrist to shoulder, little measuring marks placed at intervals along his arm and are used for measuring wampum. "There was a time", he said, "when a pretty young squaw could be purchased for a string of wampum reaching from the wrist to the shoulder."

The Smith River Indians are always gracious and obliging to their white friends, ready with Indian songs, dances and demonstrations of basket weaving. Only a few are able any longer to weave the beautiful old baskets. There are many interesting old old costumes, much of art and

beauty in their lives which should be written into a small book. The old ways of life are really giving way to civilization.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 17, of Curry County, State of Oregon, from 7:30 to 8:00 p. m. (standard time) May 31, 1950, at the school house in said district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1950-1951 over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are: To obtain additional amount necessary to maintain the school in view of the fact that the Rural School Board did not provide funds above the 6% limitation.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$27,066.70.

(Notice: meeting time is 8:30 Daylight Savings time).

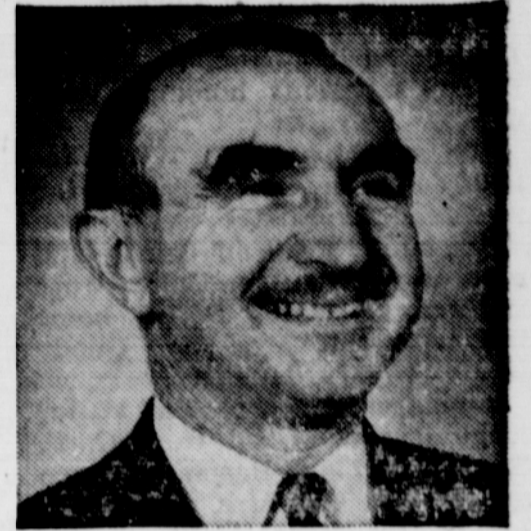

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HOW TO BE SAVED!

The greatest question ever asked by man is the question: "What Must I do to Be Saved?" Technically, we are not saved by anything that we do for God, but by what He has done for us. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God. Not of works, lest any man should boast." Eph. 2:8-9.

In order to be saved and have a home in heaven, we must not have against our records anything that defiles (Rev. 21:27). Sin defiles. Sin cannot enter into the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, if there is sin in our lives, we must get rid of it in order to enter heaven.

Of all the religious philosophies in the world, the only one that points out a reasonable method of getting rid of past sin is Christianity which points to the atoning sacrifice of Christ on Calvary for our sins. The Bible tells us all have sinned (Rom. 3:23), so all men everywhere can only be saved by accepting Christ as their Saviour. The first step we must take toward heaven is the REALIZATION of our need of Jesus as our Saviour from sin. I The second step toward heaven is *Forgiveness of Sin*, or what the theologian calls justification. We are justified only by faith in Christ: "If you give yourself to Him, and accept Him as your Saviour, then, sinful as your life may have been, for His sake you are accounted righteous. Christ's character stands in place of your character, and you are accepted before God just as if you had not sinned." Steps to Christ, on page 62.

God freely forgives your sins when we accept Christ and repent of and confess our sins: "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whose confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy." (Prov. 28:13). If we are truly sorry for our sins, God will forgive them and we will forsake them.

God's Holy 10 Commandments law points our sin in our lives. When we accept Jesus as our Saviour, He takes our place before the law as a condemned transgressor, and we are given His place before the law as a justified saint. We, by the grace of God, stand before Him as though we had never sinner, had never broken His law.

Christ said "Ye must be born again" and this is the third step to heaven. Man by nature has a sinful heart. It is natural for him to sin. We can never live right until we have a change of heart and are "Born again." The prayer of the converted sinner is, "Create in me a clean heart, O, God; and renew a right spirit within me." Psalms 51:10.

One Seventh-Day Adventist writer puts it this way: "As the sinner, drawn by the power of Christ, approaches the uplifted cross, there is a new creation. A new heart is given him. He becomes a new creature in Christ Jesus." (Christ's object Lesson, page 163). The greatest proof of a changed heart is a changed life as the old habits of sin have passed away.

The person who has been pardoned and born again is then ready and willing to follow Jesus in obeying all His commands. This is the final step toward heaven and is known as SANCTIFICATION. In the words of the Psalmist: "I delight to do Thy will, O my God, Yea, Thy law is within my heart." Ps. 40:8.

We DO NOT keep God's commandments in order to BE SAVED, but because we ARE SAVED. We can't make ourselves Christians by trying to keep the law, but we cannot be true Christians unless we obey God's commandments: "And hereby we do know that we know Him, and keepeth not His commandments is a liar, and the truth is not in him." I John 2:3-4.

The work of salvation through the Grace of God is summarized in the words of the old Seventh-Day Adventist hymn:

"Look upon Jesus, sinless is He; Father impute His life unto me My life of scarlet, my sin and woe,

Cover with His life, whiter than snow.

Reconciled by His death for my sin,

Justified by His life pure and clean,

Sanctified by obeying His word Glorified when returneth my Lord."
