

EUGENE--Appointment of C. T. Duncan as associate professor in the University of Oregon school of journalism was revealed last week.

This appointment rounds out the staff of the journalism school, according to Dean Clifford F. Weigle. Duncan has a background in almost every phase of community newspaper work. He has been a reporter, advertising manager, managing editor, photographer, and news service correspondent.

Subject to confirmation by the state board of higher education, his appointment will be effective in September.

When Duncan received his B. A. degree from University of Minnesota in 1936 he started in the active field as a reporter on the Northfield (Minn.) News, a famed weekly. He followed this with a year as advertising manager for Park Region Echo, Alexandria, Minn., and then took over the managing editorship of the Redwood Falls Sun (Minn.)
