Ashland Smothers Pelicans, 24-6, In First Home Game

Sunday, in the first Southern Oregon League game at home, Brookings Pelicans looked anything but like a baseball team, when they bowed 24 to 6 to the Ashland club, comprised almost entirely of Southern Oregon College of Education players. Afield the Pelicans showed no spirit of former games, and for six innings looked like they were not even going to get a hit.

On the other hand, Ashland was a well-drilled team, apparently capable of winning from any team, anywhere. The Ashlanders hit with the viciousness of Stan Musial, Ty Cobbs, or the big guys of the upper crust, and their fielding was almost spotless until late in the game after there ceased to be any fun left to enjoy.

Ashland started right off to repeat the performance of the previous week—and did. An error, plus a hit, a walk and another timely bingle, gave them a two-run lead, which only added to their desire for more. In the third another brace of runs were added; five in the fourth; two in the sixth; nine in the seventh; one in the eighth and three in the ninth—apparently without effort.

Astin, on the mound for the Pelicans, did a creditable job and could have made a something resembling a battle, had he been given support. He had many of the top sluggers waving at his fast ones, striking out six in the innings he worked.

Largest Estimated Crowd, Sunday, of Any Past Festival

While there was no way to obtain an accurate check on the number of people present at the church services at the Azalea State Park, Sunday, many have made estimates. It is general in the circle of estimators that 750 or more attended church services at 11 a. m.

The All-Year Events Association provided 100 loaves of bread, 18 hams, and 75 gallon of coffee, basing this conclusion on all past festivals. This would make up 1200 plates. These were used up, and the tables were literally "cleaned" according to W. S. Chadwick.

Scores of local people, knowing that a bigger crowd was in line, went home for something to eat. From this observation, the crowd at the park has been said by many to have reached the 2000 mark, Sunday.

With all local churches cooperating, and with congregations of all much in evidence, religious services were attended by the biggest crowd in history. Combined choirs of the churches provided the music, with Rev. Bill Ward reading the scripture, Rev. Lever, the prayer, Rev. Neufeld the announcements, and Rev. Leo VanDolson the sermon, visitors were impressed by the most unique of services in this section of the state.
