Stressing fellowship as an important benefit from Rotary, it lead members to want to be prompt and punctual in attendance, which was the strength of any service club.

Human relations was that important attribute which marked the success of any club, lodge or organization. Proper human relations brought greater freedom to the world.

"There is but one absolutely secure group in the world—you will find them in the penitentiaries—but they have no freedom." People who have privilege, also must accept responsibilities—they must keep abreast of times, they must do with their worldly goods something that is likely to be of most good. The schools, the lodges, churches, and these must be recipients of all we can possibly afford to give.

"We, in the United States, are required to have an understanding mind with people of foreign lands. Their conditions make the dicent nations act in the manner they do. In this understanding we not agree with them, but we must be able to see their side of the story.

"If we can obtain such an at-

titude toward other peoples, we will develop our own individualities, thus better to understand our own fellow men.

"Rotary, the granddaddy of all service clubs, seeks nothing as a club unit in way of glory. Its greatest good comes from the development of the individuals who make up its rank. You will note that Rotarians are leaders, but this is result rather than being Rotarians.

"It is always a pleasure to be a guest at dicent clubs. I always find an energetic and progressive group wherever I go."
