

# Pelicans Didn't Get Breaks; Lost 14 to 5 Game, Sun.

The Pelicans made the long trek to Central Point, Sunday, and absorbed their third straight Southern Oregon League loss, this time by a 14 to 5 score.

While each club made 10 hits, the Pels were unable to come through effectively in the clutch, as evidenced by 12 runners left stranded.

The Studs, on the other hand, combined their hits with walks and untimely Pel errors for two big innings and the game. The game had all the earmarks of a real pitchers' battle for four innings, with the Studs holding a 2-1 edge going into the last of the fifth.

Here the valley club combined two walks, three hits and two Pelican errors for six big runs. A possible double-play in this inning would have retired the side without a run.

Astin developed a wild streak in the eighth and walked three batters before Norm Lucich, the Stud center fielder hit a terrific home run over the right field fence. Result: four runs on one hit. Dick Salvage then relieved Astin and retired the side although he had the able assistance of Connie Holzgang, new center fielder from Medford who pulled down two long drives for put outs.

The Pelicans take on the Crescent City Merchants on the local field next Sunday afternoon at 2 in the first league test between these clubs. As is generally known, however, the Merchants won two pre-season games, so Manager Whitey Matson hopes to field a strengthened club and put the Pels in the win column.
