Mrs. Robert Perkins, our art chairman, has been on the alert all year and has lined up many works of fine calibre from among famous West Coast artists. Alice will have plenty of good news for you on Thursday, but we will seal a march on her and tell you of a few who are participating. Eugene Bennett, native of Oregon, has studied at University of Chicago and is at present instructing at Medford, during the summer season. As an artist member of Portland Art Museum he has exhibited at San Francisco, Portland and Chicago and is represented in several notable private collections. Then there is Hal Bishop, an Oregonian, who is perhaps the best-known to us by his fine murals. Three large ones depicting the pioneer life are in the Jackson hotel at Medford as well as a monotone of Klamath Indian life, and others of a more modern era may be seen at the Winema hotel in Klamath Falls. Mr. Bishop will exhibit many of his famous paintings, which portray the true ruggedness of those never-to-be-forgotten memories pertaining to pioneer days, all the works of a master on canvas.

It might be of interest to our members to learn, that in inaugurating an art exhibit together with our flower show as we did three years ago, we were heading into a very important trend.

While this practice had been introduced at some of the flower shows of our big eastern clubs, I think we were the first to stage one of any real importance in this section. Now comes word from New York that the National Council of Garden Clubs of America has given an art exhibit of flower arrangements in the New York museum—right in there for an entire week competing with the giants of the art world, past and present. It seems that art with flowers may now be considered an authentic one.

Judging the poster contest at our school was indeed a difficult one, but was thoroughly enjoyed. We should certainly be proud of the artistic abilities our children bring forth under the able direction of Mrs. Ellis Garcia. From the first grade up, these children have produced in colored crayons, tempera and water colors, a real splashy display of balance and thoughtful interpretation of their artistic abilities.
