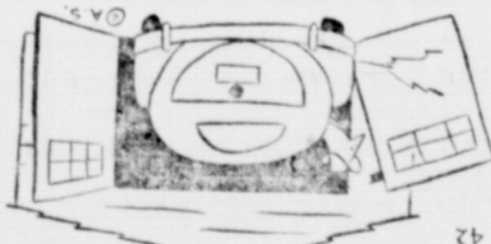

HEALTHFUL LIVING

Sometimes people are surprised to learn that Seventh-Day Adventists believe that good health is essential to the practice of good Christianity. However, in this matter, as in all others, we take our cue from the Bible itself.

First of all the Bible speaks of our bodies as the "temple of God" as we read in I Cor. 3:15,17 "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are."

So the Lord commands us not to defile His holy temple, "which temple ye are." And in I Cor. 10:31, we're told: "Whether therefore ye eat or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" A Christian should study, then, and put to practice the principles of health.

According to the Bible, we should entirely avoid the use of all narcotic poisons which certainly "defile the temple of God" if used. These narcotics include such common things as tobacco, liquor, coffee, tea, and certain cola drinks which contain as much caffeine as coffee.

The Bible also condemns the use of what it terms the "unclean" meats. (See Lev. 11). Some believe that this instruction was only for the Jews but modern science has discovered that these unclean meats contain such harmful parasites as the trichina worm in pork which certainly can infect and kill a gentile as well as a Jew.

There are some principles of health not specifically mentioned

in the Scriptures which the Christian should certainly consider. Seventh-Day Adventists do not make these a test of church fellowship but strongly recommend them to their members:

1. A vegetarian diet. It is found that the average person eats too much protein anyhow and a meatless diet has been proved to build up greater resistance to disease. However, a well-balanced diet must be substituted. If you wish more information we'll gladly furnish it.

2. Temperance in all things. Anything done in excess is harmful to the body. A Christian should be a hard and good worker but should not overwork, overeat, or overdo in any way.

3. The common-sense rules. Proper exercise, plenty of fresh air, good, restful sleep, and 4 to 6 glasses of water each day.

4. Stop Worrying! Here the Christian definitely has the advantage because he can claim the Bible promise, "Come unto Me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Matt. 11:28.

The Biblical rule "whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap" works in our physical life as well as the spiritual. God has ordained certain laws of nature which if we violate will result in poor health, sickness, disease, and pre-mature death. We owe it to ourselves, as well as to our God, to understand these laws of health and apply them to our own lives.
