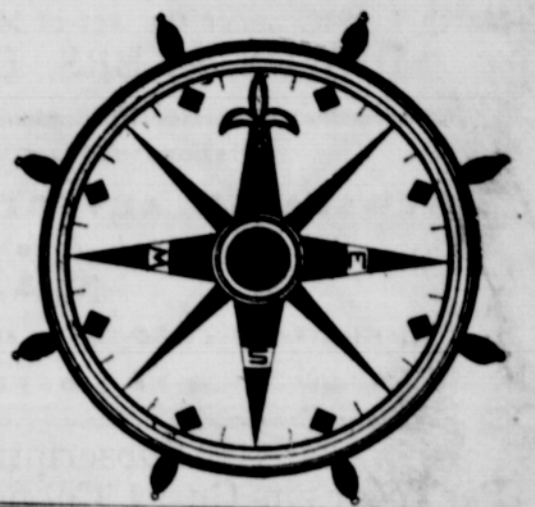

## PARADE IS MONDAY

**Judging Starts At Noon; Parade Will Commence At 2:00**

It is with considerable pride that Azalea Garden Club announces the addition of the Traveling Exhibit of the Oregon Camera Club to the art exhibit of its annual flower show, July 2, 3 and 4, during the lily festival.

This community will have an opportunity to view the work of some nationally-known camera artists. Everyone will see original works of some of the best men with a camera in this country. Perhaps, without knowing it, everyone will see these pictures, or have seen them, in national magazines, newspapers and in general commercial use. This traveling exhibit has only been shown in major exhibits in key cities of the United States and has just been released from the Portland Museum of Art.

Miss Juanita Smith of Eugene, is spending this week-end at the B. J. Gould home.

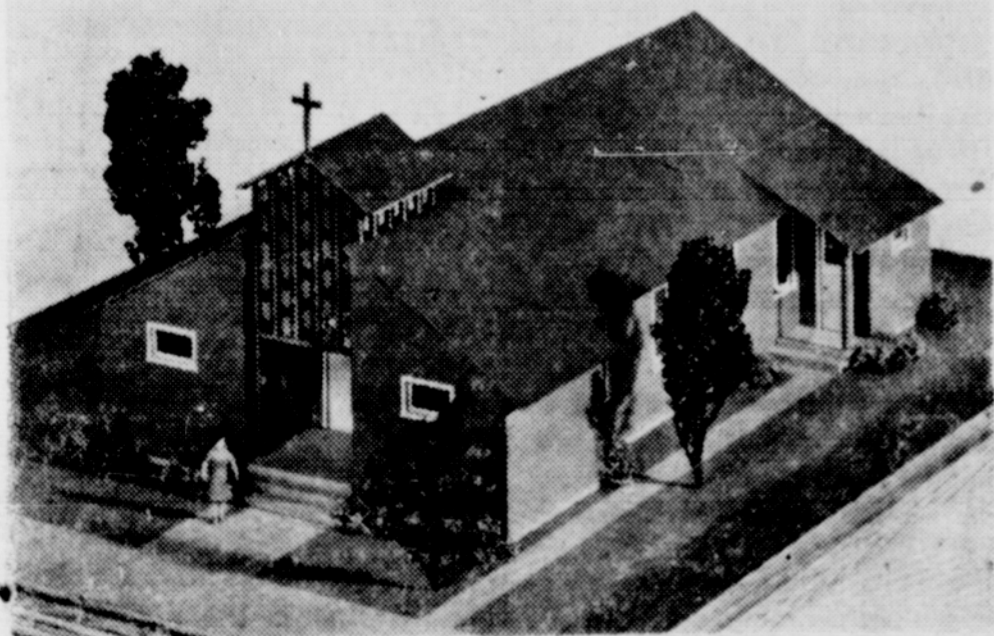
**"Consider The Lilies . . ." Theme For 1950 "Showing"**

**Photography Will Be Included In Art Exhibit This Year**

This year Brookings-Harbor will hold its fourth annual Lily Festival on July 2, 3 and 4, contrary to rumors otherwise. The parade, the only one of its kind in the world, will be held on Monday, July 3, beginning at 2 o'clock. Floats will assemble between 12 and 1:30 for judging at the old mess hall, in Brookings.

Many are the attractions to entertain the visitor. Besides the colorful parade, the conducted tours through lily fields, tours of three state parks in the area will be the fireworks display, and the carnival on the midway.

Given in conjunction with the lily festival will be the annual flower show and art exhibit by Azalea Garden Club, which will open at 2 p. m. Sunday, July 2 at the high school gym (see page nine for details).

Azalea Garden club puts on one of the most outstanding flower shows and art exhibits to be held in the state. Affiliated with the national council of garden clubs, this club stages, meeting all the national standards in competition for the purple ribbon, a national award.

The art exhibit is featuring the works of well-known west coast artists. Among them are James Kroeter of Portland; Eugene Bennett of Medford, also represented at the Portland Museum; Hal E. Bishop, Monnell, Platz and many other representing Oregon. From Humboldt State College comes the works of Cady, Everett, Stebbins, Williams, Anderson, Knight and McLean.
