James B. Greene, was buried in the same place. The two brothers had not seen each other for nearly fifty years, since they parted at the old home in Ohio. Tim had died before his brother arrived at Deer Park.

Next week, I'll tell you more about the Rev. James B. Greene and about the two schools in the Eckley country. (Florence Chapman, a retired teacher residing at North Bend, was one of the early teachers). And I'll tell you more about the four post office names; and something about the double wedding at Eckley 55 years ago, of which one of the couples is still living in Myrtle Point; and something about the gold mines back in the hills.

June 27, 1950—To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Del Norte County, Crescent City:

This is similar to the laws that wrecked the economy of the European countries, and we feel that there is no place in America for an "Iron Curtain," or, as this case may be, a "Milk Curtain."

Actions of this kind are harmful to the friendly relations of neighboring communities. Undoubtedly this action was taken on the spur of the moment without giving much thought as to its true meaning.

We hope that after studying this matter that you will rescind
