

Astin Generous With White-Wash To Blank Visitors, 12 To 0, Here Sun. P. M.

When Thompson, second Rogue River batter got a scratch hit just out of the outstretched hand of Bill Jollie at first in the first inning, Bob Astin slammed the door in the face of the remainder of the visiting batters, Sunday afternoon to whitewash Rogue River by a 12 to 0 score. Bill Jollie, who has more stretch than Aunt Jemima's girdle, really tried to stop that hit which just missed his outstretched hands by a couple of inches. Astin's white-wash brush was 8-men wide, and the Pelicans turned in almost errorless ball, except for Astin's lone error in the ninth.

The Pelicans lost no time in win a ball game. McClean teased asserting that they wanted to a walk, went to third on Matson's hit, and came home on Barrett's infield out. Bufaro drove in Matson. In the Second Finnell really tee-ed off on a pitch for a round-tripper. A brace were added in the fourth, and Matejka, Rogue River hurler was sent to the showers in the sixth when the Pelicans unlimbered their artillery for five runs. Manager Kidwell got by the seventh but had his efforts blasted in the eighth for another brace.

Astin Got Tougher By Innings
After walking the first batter in the first, Thompson got his hit, and from then on Astin was stingier than a Scotch ticket-peddler. He whiffed a couple of batters, and the sixth man popped out to the infield.

On several occasions Astin got himself into trouble by his wildness, but usually his teammates yanked the scoring threats out of danger.

By time the seventh inning had been reached, Homer Haggerty came to Manager Lesmeister and begged that Astin be relieved, for after that Astin was costing

him (Haggerty) money for he agreed to pay \$1 per strikeout over ten. Astin at that time had 12 out by the swinging route.

Norris Kemp, generously offered to give a couple of admission tickets to the show for the home runs—he lost there, too. Astin's shutout also cost him a couple more.

Astin Makes Only Error
If Astin lives to be an old man he will always be able to point back to this game as one where his teammates gave him air-tight and errorless support. Bob alone committed the only error when, in the ninth he over-threw first in fielding a bunt. However, his strikeouts saved him from damage, as he filled the bases by walks.
