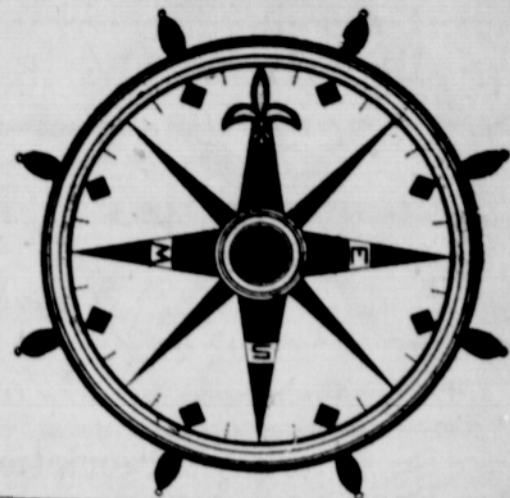

PELICANS REVERSE SCORE, SUNDAY, 8 TO 6, TO NUDGE MYRTLE CREEK
