Involved in the deal are the Chetco Home and Auto Supply Company and the Olympia Hdw. and Supply Company, dealing in logging and mill supplies.

Chetco Home and Auto Supply Company handles a full line of hardware, paints, and sporting goods. Located in the Grayshel this firm also handles the G. E. appliances.

They opened the Chetco Home and Auto Supply Co. in the Gardner building, present home of the Olympia Hardware and Supply Co. 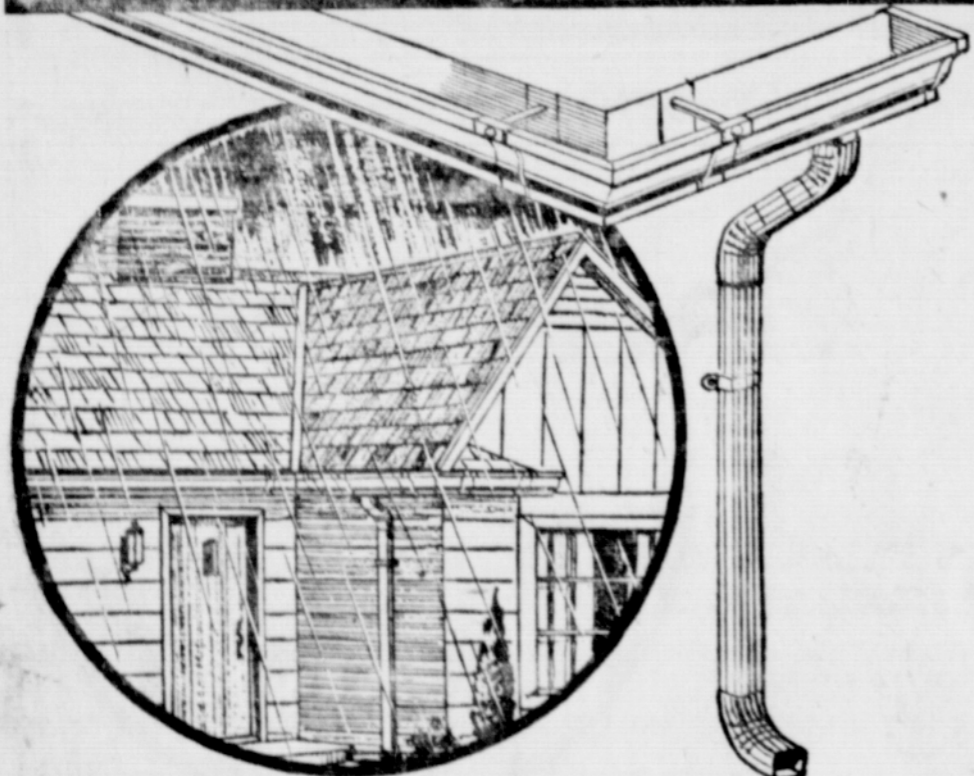
