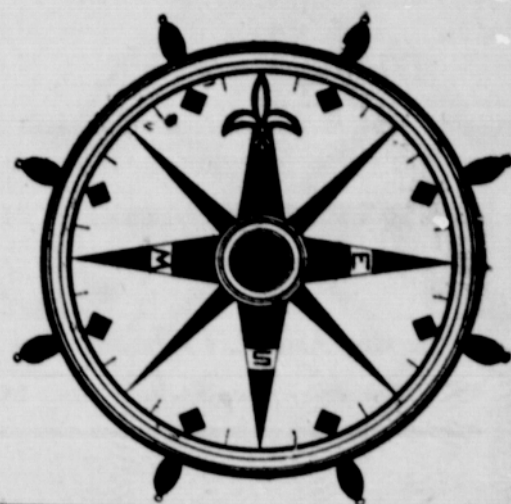

Porisch Warns All Power Saw Users

John Porisch, district ranger, was in town Wednesday morning to warn people of this area of the extreme danger which may come from power chain saws in the forests, citing the fire last week near Port Orford as an example (see account elsewhere in this issue).

Mr. Porisch was emphatic in pointing out that the damage is usually started in the area of felled and bucked timber. He referred again to the Port Orford fire for example. He told the Pilot a few rules to follow:

1. Keep motor clean.
2. Equip with fire extinguisher. (One is built especial for power saws and dare available).
3. After filling with gas, and before starting, wipe all gas from motor and allow a few minutes for gas to evaporate.
4. Move to safe location for starting. Do not start over area where gas may have been spilled while filling.

Southwest Oregon, Porisch said, has been haunted by a number of fires started by power saws.

Forest Fire Near Smith River Battled Over Week-End; More Than 200 On Line

SMITH RIVER—Forest fire, which broke out Saturday evening in the Gasquet area of the Six Rivers National Forest, on the south fork of Rowdy Creek, has already pressed more than 300 men onto the line to battle the raging flames now into heavy timber and under-brush. Tuesday it had burned over 400 acres.

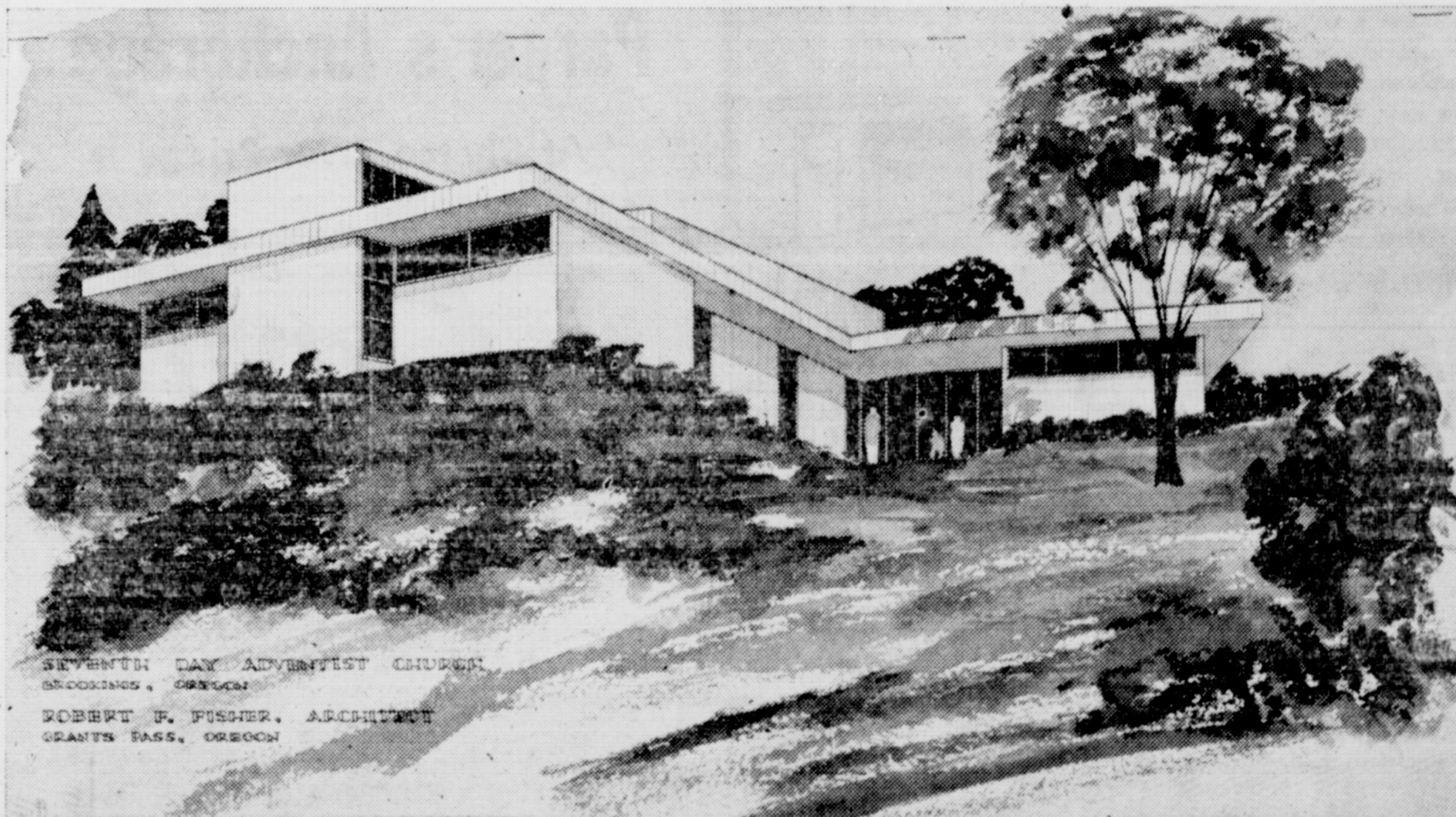
Rev. and Mrs. Mumbower have visited here during the vacations in recent years and have many friends in and about Brookings, and to come here was the answer almost, to a wish.

Seventh-Day Adventists Call For Bids On Construction Of Church

Drawings and details have now been completed for the new Seventh-Day Adventist church, pictured above, and the call for bids is now being made, bids to be opened on August 31. Building schedule calls for completion by next January.

The church will be located on two lots next to the old Chetco

Inn, and will overlook the town. The main chapel of the building will seat about 180 people. However, seating capacity will be about 250 with the overflow space being provided in the Junior's room just behind the nave.

Additional rooms include Sabbath school rooms, choir-robing room, pastor's study, Dorcas S-

ociety room, and a glassed-in and sound-proof mother's room, wired for sound so that the mothers can observe and listen to the service without having to worry about the children disturbing the rest of the audience.

The building itself is a frame-type, L-shaped, and finished with vertically-running tongue and

groove siding. Designer of the contemporary-styled church is Robert F. Fisher, architect of Grants Pass. Adventist church services will continue to be held at the Grange hall in Harbor until the new church is ready for occupancy.
