

# PELICANS DIVIDE DOUBLE-HEADER, SUNDAY, WITH ROSEBURG CHIEFS

Fighting desperately to keep in reaching distance of first division, Sunday, the Brookings Pelicans split a double header with the fast-stepping Roseburg Chiefs, No. 2 team in the league, to accomplish something no other team has been able to do, except Ashland. Brookings lost the first, 8 to 0, but won the second 9-1.

With Sporer, ex-Salem hurler on the mound, Roseburg applied whitewash generously to Brookings Pelicans in the first game, Sunday, and in the meantime, jumped onto Dick Salvage for four runs in the first inning, one in the second, on three hits, before Westbrook came to the rescue. Westbrook hurled the remainder of the game, and only once was in trouble, that in the fifth when Roseburg put together three runs.

Sporer, on the other hand, issued, grudgingly, only three hits and was a Midas all the way. *Second Game Entirely Different*

Believing that he would have no trouble subduing the Pelicans in the second game (seven innings by agreement) Sporer attempted the "iron man" stunt by starting the second game.

In this game, due partly to his tiring, his curves had little fooling power to the hit-hungry Pelicans. Connie Holzgang got a double, and before the smoke cleared, three Pelican runs were marked up.

Shotwell, a new pitcher in the Pelican fold, doing hurling chores out-did Sporer by being just as stingy with hits. The lone run scored on him was his own fault in a way, as he bobbled a ball in throwing out a runner, who later scored. Sporer retired in the sixth, but the damage was already done by that time, as the Pelicans made up for lost time to score nine.

In the first, McLean walked, went to third of Holzgang's double. Matson went out, pitcher to first; Barrett popped to short, clutch with a singing single to score McLean and Holzgang, and moved to second on a wild pitch, Bo Clingman, OSC catcher, also Bill Jollie came through in the got a clutch single to shove Bill Jollie across. Sporer settled and in the next three innings allowed but one hit.

In the fifth Holzgang singled, stole second when Kirkpatrick dropped Matson's high fly to right field. After 15 innings, Sporer definitely tired in the sixth as the Pelicans unloaded to score five runs on four hits, a base on balls and a Roseburg error. Cy Whidden put out the fire, and hurled hitless ball the remainder of the distance.

Erst-while infielder Barrett assumed his new centerfield position like a Pelican to water. His play was nothing short of sensational as he hauled in seven fly balls in the two games and made two real throws to the place and started another relay out to third.

The second game, postponed by rain at Roseburg, some weeks ago, was a make-up. Ashland is the only other club in the circuit that has beaten Roseburg, fresh out of the state tournament. The box score, both games:
