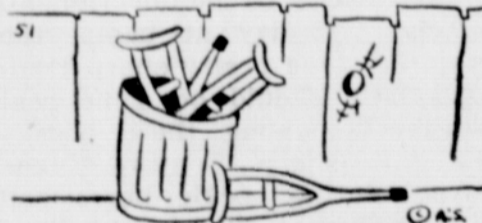
"Mind" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, August 20.
