

Grants Pass Forfeits Game, Sun., To Close 1950 Season For Pelican Players

Grants Pass, scheduled to meet Brookings Pelicans on the local diamond, Sunday, called late Saturday to say that the Grants Pass team had disbanded, after a mediocre season, and that the game was forfeited to Brookings by the score of 9 to 0. Followers of the Pelicans were forced to go to Crescent City, to satisfy their appetite for baseball, and watch Don Clauson hurl a 2-hitter at Myrtle Creek, to win by a 2 to 0 score.

The manager of Grants Pass baseball team phoned Pete late in the week and announced that his club had withdrawn from the league due to lack of sufficient players and for that reason the Grants Pass club would be unable to play the scheduled game here Sunday.

The league secretary was notified and the game was forfeited to Brookings. Next Sunday the schedule calls for Brookings to travel to Rogue River, however, that club has also withdrawn from the league, so the Pels will gain another victory without swinging a bat.

While Brookings currently rests in sixth place in league play, the Pelicans still have a very good chance to land in the play-offs possible ties for third and fourth spots in the standings.

Crescent City has a "toughie" coming up against Central Point next Sunday, and even though the Merchants should lose, they will still be in a tie with Brookings, providing the Merchants are awarded the two protested games against Ashland and Grants Pass.

Myrtle Creek has two tough games against Ashland and Central Point and a double loss would drop that club from third to the sixth spot. Ashland is also still very much in the running for the play-offs. The Pelicans are attempting to line up a game for next Sunday so as to keep in shape for the post-season series.
