Don Cate, Rotary 'Fellow,' Tells Of His Year In Europe

Continued from Page One in England. My appreciation was given another lift the moment I set foot on French soil. The entire year I was in Europe, I actually came to love my country.

"Americans wonder why there is so much difficulty in Europe—why those nations cannot get together and become as one nation such as ours. Let us look at the situation in this way: In this country, when we go from one state to another, we do not have to go through the customs—do not have to pay duty—and

do not run into another language on the other side of the line.

"The Marshall plan has helped Europe immeasurably. They had to have it to exist at all. But I view Europe as a group of people who cannot learn to do things in a new way. They have too many barriers, from one nation to another. They hold to their old traditions and customs, which do not augment best of feelings among the various nations.

"Without the Marshall Plan aid, I am not sure what would have become of Europe. At best the return to normalcy will be long and difficult.

"I have traveled in Germany, Austria and Switzerland quite extensively, and in Germany and Austria the people are fearful of the future, and hope seems to be a task to keep. Threat of Communism is like an impending doom, which surely seems destined to happen.

"In America, we must arm—we must pattern after Switzerland and have almost total mobilization—we must be ready to strike anywhere at any time."

Mrs. Cate, upon being asked, as an Austrian-born person, to give her side of the picture, rose quickly and added many points to the talk given by her husband, and told something of the feeling

of being under Nazi domination during World War 2, and how she came to apply for passage to America as an "exchange" student. She concluded by saying that she like America much because it was so big, so full of opportunities, and such an enjoyable place to live because the people do not cling to old traditions—like to try new ways of performing their tasks.

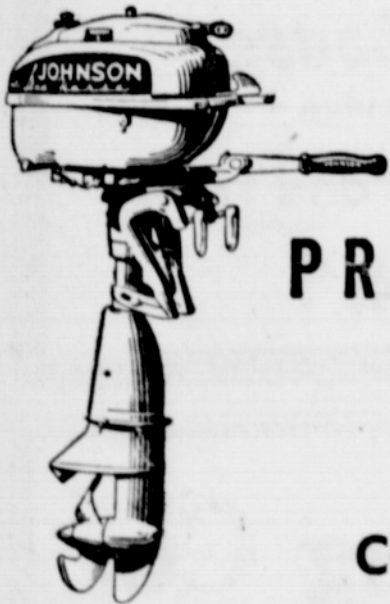
