

PELICANS BOOT BALL AND CHANCE TO WIN OVER CENTRAL POINT, SUN.

Maybe it was the near 100 degree heat at Central Point, Sunday, and maybe it was the condition of the playing field, anyway Brookings Pelicans weren't their usual selves as the Cheney Studs romped on them for a 9 to 3 win, and gained the right to meet Roseburg in the final game of the post-season play-offs. Roseburg edged Ashland, 6 to 5, Sunday afternoon.

Ex-big leaguer Paul Gehrman was not the same pitcher the Pelicans defeated in an exhibition game here on July 2. In the game Sunday he was really on, holding the Pelicans to six hits and striking out 12 while not issuing a base on balls. He allowed his first hit in the fourth, an infield bounder by McLean, which got by First Baseman Gitzen. In the fifth a single by Chandler, a free trip to first by Jollie as he was hit by a pitched ball and another single by Fasel filled the bases but Gehrman tightened and retired the side. Connie Holzgang singled to start the eighth. Whitey Matson gained first and Holzgang was safe on an attempted force play as Stammen dropped the ball. Jim Barrett then hit a tremendous triple over center-fielder Blevin's head to score Holzgang and Matson. Barrett later scored on Tex Chandler's fly to left, to end the Brookings run production.

Floyd Shotwell on the mound for the Pelicans allowed a double and gave up a walk in the first inning but the first of the three Pelican double plays pulled him out of trouble. A walk and a hit batsman put two runners on in the second but again a double play retired the side. A single, a double and two more singles gave Central Point their first two runs in the third with no outs but Shotwell worked himself out of the hole without any further damage.

The roof really fell in on the Pelicans in the fourth as the Studs came through with four hits for six big runs. Five Pelican errors in this frame aided the scoring to a large extent as only two of these runs were of the earned variety. The Studs scored their final tally in the sixth on Mellbye's double. He came in when the ball eluded Bill McLean in left for another Brookings error.

The defeat was disappointing to quite a number of faithful Brookings fans who made the "trip over the hill," however, as stated last week, the Pelicans have had a very successful season, first in the Southern Oregon league, and are to be commended on the showing. The old adage: "You can't win 'em all" still holds true. The box score:
