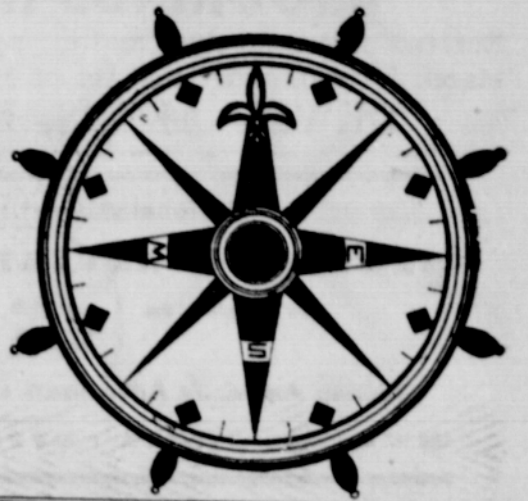

Fire "Accidents" Snuffs Life Of Port Orford Man

PORT ORFORD — Tragedy struck again in the woods last Wednesday when a D8 Caterpillar, being operated by Gordon Johnston on a steep incline, at a logging operation, south of here, overturned on him, pinning him down and starting a fire.

Despite heroic efforts of Johnston's employees, to extinguish the blaze he was badly burned. He pleaded with the men to chop him loose as there was no equipment available to lift the heavy tractor from him. It was necessary to amputate his leg below the knee to free him, from thence rushed to the Gold Beach hospital.

Despite every attention given him, he died early Thursday due to shock and loss of blood.

Charles Coyne, an employee, is said to have given a quart of blood in a vain attempt to save Johnston's life.

A partner of J. A. Abston, in the logging firm of Abston and Johnston, he was 33 years old. Surviving are his widow, Elinor, daughter Noreen and son, Van, four brothers, Earl, Elias, James and Clarence, and three sisters, Ollie Gibson, Mamie Delano, and Ethel Rollo, of Tacoma, who arrived a few hours of his death, having driven all night in an attempt to reach here in time to be of assistance.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Johnston, also live at Tacoma.

The body was taken to that city for funeral services and interment, Monday.

Enrollment In Locals Schools Set All-Time Record; Teachers Added

Last week, the faculty and school board thought they had troubles to solve. This week, a great deal has been added, in a further increase of enrollment at the local schools.

In order to care for this increased enrollment the church basement has been rented again and grades 1 and 2, town children, assigned to that classroom with Mrs. Evelyn DeMoss as teacher.

It will be noted that in the first three grades no teacher has less than 27 enrolled, with state standards calling for 25 average daily membership.

All full grades above the third have been assigned as least 30 pupils, with the combined grades having 27 and 28, respectively.

"Crusade" To Give Europe Story Of America's Plans

"The Crusade for Freedom," a mass movement designed to create and transmit effective anti-Communist and "pro-freedom" propaganda to the people of the prisoner countries behind the iron curtain and to the peoples of other countries of the communist rule, is in Curry county.

Charles H. Grayshel has been named county chairman of the movement, and Mrs. Goldie V. Smith has been named secretary of the local group, to accept donations. Chairmen for the other communities of the county will be named as soon as Mr. Grayshel is able to contact them.

The crusade is an outgrowth of the National Committee for Free Europe. This committee, formed in 1949, at the suggestion of General Eisenhower, is directly attacking the spread of communism.

The national committee for Free Europe first of all provides a haven for exiled leaders of prisoner countries. And then it uses the voices of these exiles, popular and well known in their home lands, as effective counter-propaganda against the four hundred thousand words a day which pour out of 85 Russian and satellite radio stations plus the tons of material emitted by the Russian controlled press.

They are thus providing a dynamic campaign of freedom and truth to maintain the hope of freedom of the oppressed people of the world and to combat the lies about America that are circulated by the Russians.

The national committee has established a radio station in Western Germany, Radio Free Europe. Six hours a way, seven days a week, programs are beamed behind the iron curtain to Czechoslovakia and Roumania.

Three more radio stations are now being built. Radio free Europe will be expanded to a five to eight-station network, directed at all of Eastern Europe.

Donations of the people of this nation are important. Russia is telling Europe that this station is being financed by the capitalists of America, and that the rank and file of Americans wish to become Communists. Personal donations will put another lie to the Russian line of chatter which pours into the ears of the slave millions of Europe.
