Adventists Start Church Building

Work began last Monday on Seventh-Day Adventist church, which is being built on the hill overlooking town, next to the Chetco Inn. The lot has been cleared and the road which approaches from the rear of the Chetco Inn, has been graded.

J. B. Meehan of Murphy, Ore., a town close to Grants Pass, has been selected by the church to supervise construction. He was in town last Monday organizing the building program.

The schedule for construction calls for completion of the contemporary-style church by January, 1951. Much of the labor needed for erection of the building will be donated by local church members.

P. Howard Adams has been selected by the church as chairman of the fund-raising committee. His task will be the raising of the additional \$10,000 needed to complete the structure.

The Gold Beach Seventh-Day Adventist church, which is also under supervision of Leo VanDolson, district pastor, is also in process of constructing a new church there. Seating capacity of the Gold Beach church will be 70 while the local church, when completed, will seat 250.
