In a woods accident last week, Bill Nutt miraculously escaped serious injury or death when a large stump rolled down the hillside onto the canopy of his Caterpillar tractor, he was operating, pressing him over, doubled up, with canopy bent over on him. Quick thinking by Blaine Marsh and Orris Smith who were working nearby was largely accountable for saving his life. They hooked a cable from another tractor onto the stump and with care, rolled it off Nutt, then quickly pulled the canopy from atop of him, to sit him upright. He had stopped breathing in the cramped position, but resumed immediately upon being freed. The stump was estimated by N. B. Marsh, on whose logging operation the accident occurred,

to weigh in the neighborhood of four tons. Nutt was immediately taken to the Coos Bay hospital where he was found to be suffering from severe bruises and contusions. He was brought to his home for convalescing.
