P. K. Lantz, Sixes, Seeks Job As Co. Commissioner

P. K. Lantz, of Sixes, candidate for county commissioner in north Curry district, who visited this area last Wednesday, wishes to let people know, he claims, that he has no other political aspiration than to have Curry progress in the same ratio as the remainder of the state. He has moved to Curry County, and he loves everything about it—most of all, its progress.

Born Aug. 5, 1895, at Frenchtown, New Jersey, he attended schools at Easton Pa. During the first world war he served 3½ years with the army, 17 months of which were spent in France.

From 1920 to 1928 he worked as journeyman plasterer in the bigger cities, coming to Portland in 1926 to live. There he entered the postal service as carrier in the city, working until 1944 when he retired due to war disabilities.

He moved to Sixes in 1944, and has served on the school board for three years. He has been a member of the county Republican central committee. His son attends Port Orford high.

Besides being a member of the Port Orford American Legion

Disabled American Veterans of Portland, and member of the Port Orford Masonic lodge.

"Curry County must progress—it must keep abreast of Oregon, and work with the remainder of the state. I want to help this cause by being a county commissioner," he avows.

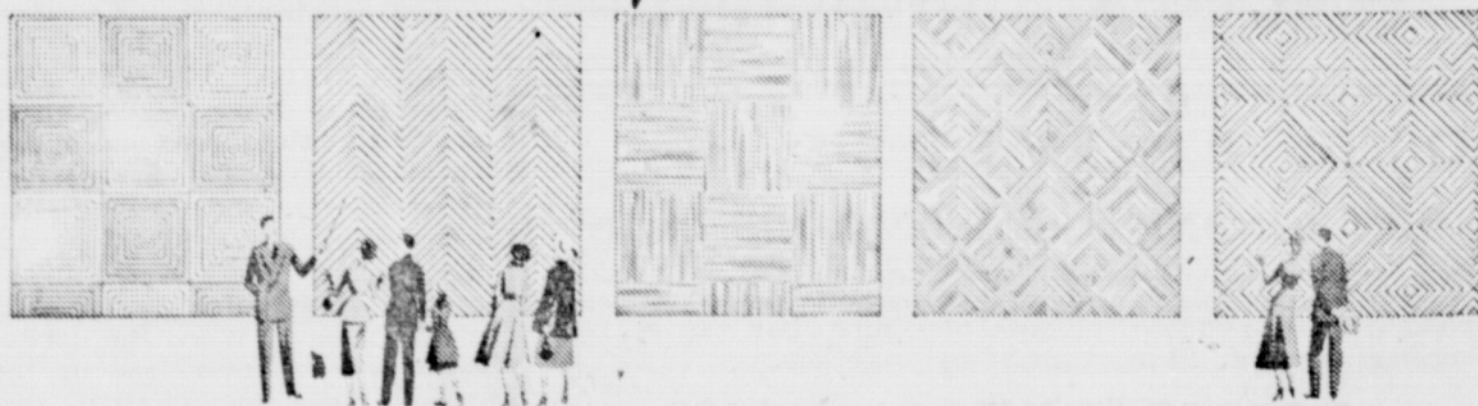
