

Along Azalea Row

One of our garden club members has recently moved into a new home and was discussing bulb planting and storage with Mrs. Ruth Bathiany, horticulture chairman of Azalea Garden Club. I listened in, thinking some of our readers would be interested in her remarks.

"Good housekeeping in the garden begins in October," said she, "and a cleanup job now saves a lot of trouble in the spring. Certain bulbs must be lifted, cleaned, and stored at this time. Others, early blooming flowers, are set out."

"After landscaping plan for a garden is made, and the soil prepared, the small early blooming bulbs can be set out. With the exception of iris, most bulbs go into the ground at the depth of twice their size."

"Grape hyacinths should be set out immediately so as to make some foliage before the winter rains come. Planted now, are other well-loved minor bulbs such as crocus, scilla, ixia, sparaxis, montbretia, tigridia, ranunculus."

"Narcissus bulbs are lifted now, cleaned and replanted. There are some new varieties, including pink daffodils." (I like daffodils yellow, and I don't like black pansies!) "Next come the tulips, and last the lilies. These are treated in the same manner as narcissus."

"All should be in the ground before the heavy fall rains in early November."

"The bulbs which are to be stored until spring are dahlias, gladioli, and tuberous begonias. When the foliage is yellow, the gladioli are lifted, hung for a short time, and then cleaned and stowed in paper bags with naphthalene flakes. Put somewhere out of reach of mice and squirrels. Dahlia bulbs are dug later when the foliage is yellow. They are cared for in the same manner as gladioli."

"Here in this country, tuberous begonias do not become dormant as they should. Therefore, the gardener must aid them by ceasing to water about the first of November, and cutting back some of the foliage. Do not, however, remove all the green top. This must not be broken off or the bulb will be ruined."

"Cease watering, and a few weeks later dig the bulb, allow to dry for about a week and then clean and store in dry peat moss until early spring."

Azalea Garden Club will hold a bulb sale at the October 19 meeting. Some of the bulbs mentioned above may be purchased at that time.

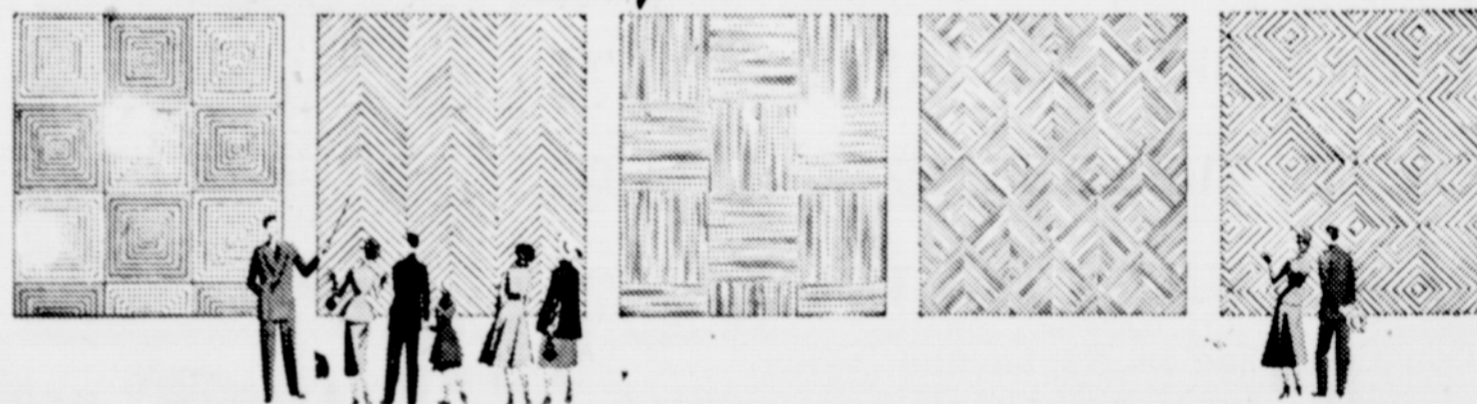
